INDIAN HERITAGE WEEK IN NORTH CAROLINA

In March, 1980, Governor Jim Hunt declared the fourth week in September to be Indian Heritage Week in North Carolina in recognition

of the many monumental contributions of Native Americans. Since then, Indian Heritage Week has become an annual observance.

This year, Indian Heritage Week in North Carolina has been proclaimed for September 19-25, 1982. The various activities scheduled during this week set aside in honor of Native Americans will be coordinated by the North Carolina Commission of Indian Affairs. The various activities have been planned to make the public more aware of the more than 10,000 year history of North Carolina whose population today is comprised of the largest Na-

tive American population of any state east of the Mississippi River. The Governor's Intertribal Indian Council, which is made up of representatives from each state with an Indian Commission or Indian Agency that oversees the affairs of Indian people, will meet Monday, September 23, at 2:30 p.m., in the Old Main building on the PSU Campus. Miss Trudie Locklear received treatment on Monday morning at Southeastern General Hospital's Emergency Room.


Mrs. Odessa Locklear returned home from Southeastern General Hospital on Tuesday. Her condition is better.
