MENDOUS INDIAN ART EXHIBIT COMING TO PSU NOV. 22

PSU's Native American Resource Center is excited to announce that for an eight-week period from Nov. 22 to Jan. 15, a tremendous Indian art exhibit will be at the center through the courtesy of the Institute of American Indian Arts in Santa Fe, N.M.

The Lumbee Regional Development Assn. of Pembroke is co-sponsoring the exhibit along with PSU's Native American Resource Center. The exhibit would thus be up for both the Thanksgiving and Christmas holiday periods.

The person responsible for the bringing the exhibit to PSU is 12 Jame Mayner Lecklesz, director of the Lumbee River Native American Center for the Arts, which is in its third

year of operation. Mrs. Locklear and her staff visited the Santa Fe institute in June of 1981 and immediately took steps to invite the exhibit to Pembroke. At that time Craig Locklear and Harold Locklear of Pembroke were attending a summer session at the institute. Craig now works there as an instructor, while Harold is art instructor for the Robeson County Indian Education Pro-

"This is an exceptional opportunity for our students erested in art in Robeson County," said Mrs. Locklear. "It will give them a new perspective about American Indian art. We believe the students of PSU will also be greatly interested."

The exhibit, entitled "One With The Earth," contains 45 beadwork, weaving and bas-

Putting the exhibit together was the Bureau of Indian Affairs which did so for the nation's Bicentennial in 1976. Its purpose as stated was "to re with Native and non-Native America the richness and variety of Native American heritage which continues to contribute significantly to the life of our nation."

Mrs. Locklear and PSU have worked closely with Charles Dally, director of the Institute of American Indian Art Museum, in arranging the

During the eight-week per-iod that the exhibit will be in PSU's Native American Resource Center, it will be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m7 Mondays through Fridays. From PSU, the exhibit goes to the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C.
