Beverages Taste Better in Glass

For years, many veteran beer, soda and fruit juice drinkers, have publicly proclaimed their preference for glass bottles and containers for their favorite beverages.



The reasons these consumers prefer glass containers vary. Many believe that beverages simply taste better in glass, while others say being able to see the contents in an ice cold bottle makes the beverage that much more appealing. Still others claim that picking up a frosty bottle adds to the satisfaction of their favorite drink.

Of course, there are those who doubt that people have a preference for any particular beverage container. But now a recent study prepared by an independent consumer research group indicates that the long-standing preference for glass containers is based on a strong belief that beer, soda and fruit drinks taste better, retain carbonation longer and look better. Some consumers even went so far as to say that they disliked the taste of any beverage in anything other than glass.

Allied Chemical, a leading producer of soda ash, a raw material used in the manufacture of glass containers, notes that the study indicates that consumer preference for glass is both real and evident in the marketplace.
