With the introduction of the new M-1 Abrams tank, the North Carolina Army National Guard has a need for personnel to be trained in the operation of this new computerized weaponry. The NC National Guard has announced the assignment of a 30-man platoon to be filled by qualified Guardsmen from this area. This platoon will train under the "buddy platoon" concept...progressing through the entire Basic Training and Advanced Train-

ing phases as one group. These soldiers will be the first in the State trained to operate as crewmen on the M-1 Abrams. Departure is scheduled for 14 March 1983 so the time is now for those men in this area who want to become "the first" M-1 Abrams tank crewmen in North Carolina Army National Guard.
