As part of the Chancellor's Visiting Scholars Program at PSU, Dr. Joseph Tulchin, professor of history and director of International Programs at UNC-Chapel Hill, will speak twice at Pembroke State on Wednesday, Nov. 14. Both talks will be in room 225 of Classroom North.

**NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING**

The Robeson County Title IV, Part A Indian Education Program will hold an open public meeting on Monday, November 12, 1984 at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room at the Robeson County Board of Education. This meeting is open to parents of Indian children who attend school in the District (including person acting in loco parentis other than school administrators or officials), teachers employed by the District, and secondary Indian students.

The purpose of the meeting is: (1) To encourage the active involvement and participation of Indian parents in educational decision making by:

(1) Providing a description of the proposed Indian Education Program for 1985-1986; (2) Providing a description of the various alternatives (programs and activities which are allowable) available under the program; (3) Providing reasonable time for discussion of proposed project activities, and; (4) Eliciting comments and recommendations which will be taken into consideration before the project application is submitted.

Your input is important! Through your cooperation and active involvement, the project will be able to identify and design activities which best address the needs of Indian students! Mark your calendar and make plans to attend on Monday, November 12, 1984.
