When that figure was announced at the Board meeting at which the team was recognized, you could sense that the young ladies were, likewise, proud of that accomplishment. You have to know that, with the amount of time that is spent by athletes in practicing as well as playing in their games, it requires extra effort to find the time to do well academically. These ladies, doubtless were able to find the time.

I am certain that, even after the newness of their accomplishment has faded, they will carry its memory with them as long as they live. While Robesonians may not remember it as well as the partici-pants do as time goes by, the trophy commemorating their success residing in the trophy case at their school, will serve as a reminder whenever a visitor to the school stops to look.


