A highly trained National Service Officer from the DAV's Winston-Salem office will meet with you personally. "This veterans' benefits expert offers you the best

counseling and claim filing assistance you and your family can get," DAV National Adjutant Arthur H. Wilson said in a letter inviting local veterans and their families to visit the Mobile Service Office.

That's important, he said, because, "So many disabled veterans feel confused about benefits and services they've earned. There's so much to know... and so many changes from one year to the next.
