The Printer of this Gazette, is under the unpleasant necessity of informing his subscribers, (to whom he takes this opportunity of making the most hearty acknowledgments for the very liberal and extensive encouragement he has experienced in the pursuit of his business, since his first establishment here, notwithstanding the bickerings of Partisans)—That in consequence of a positive avowal of the Post-Master at this town, to stop the circulation of this Gazette, by preventing the post riders from carrying it to its subscribers in the country, after this day, although the Printer has made contracts with the carriers of the mails, to that effect, with whom he presumes that right exclusively exists—he is apprehensive that the existence thereof will soon be extinct, which must eventually cause the removal of his Printing-Office.

By this step of the Post-Master, which has never been taken towards any other Printer hitherto established in this town, which is unprecedented in this State, not justified by the Laws of our Country, and entirely unprovoked; the citizens living in the counties composing the District of Wilmington, and also the neighboring counties, would be excluded from the benefits resulting to a free people from the circulation of the only Vehicle of Intelligence to which they have access.

Whether the power to deprive those people of the most inestimable privilege granted to them by a free and good government; and to ruin a young man, who has ever had in view the welfare and happiness of the United States, the country that gave him birth, and to which he is exclusively attached; & who by honest industry has endeavoured to acquire the means of support, and to become a useful member to the community; is vested in this man, or by what authority he assumes that power, shall be a matter of legal investigation, in case the attempt is made.—And if it should be found that he is justified in his conduct by that authority, which he acts, then, and not till then, will the Printer be satisfied (as he becomes a good citizen with the operation of the laws of his country, and relinquish the business which is the only mean to his subsistence.

N. B. Should the subscribers on the road not receive this day's paper by the hands of the post riders, it is hoped they will not attach blame to the Printer—he attaches them that he will be assiduous in finding out private opportunities to convey it and the preceding numbers to them. In a short time a stage will be established by some gentlemen in Fayetteville, to run once a week between the two places, which will afford a better conveyance.
