The brig Jane, of Baltimore, capt. Wm. Kennedy, of 16 guns and 54 men. from Jeremie bound to Baltimore, with a cargo of West-India produce, was captured by a French privateer of 4 guns and 84 men, called the Bien Amie, after an action of two hours and a half. Capt. Kennedy, his mate, and 33 men were killed and 8 wounded. The privateer had 3 men killed and 10 wounded. A sch'r belonging to Puiladelphia and two schooners belonging to Baltimore, all from the same place, under convoy of the Jane, were taken. Capt. Kennedy. his mate and most of the crew were murdered after they had surrendered.


