

of his walks lately, a boatman happened to fall in the river, he was taken out through the exertions of his companion in the boat, and carried ashore. Alexander challenged to the spot where the drowned man was landed, and assisted his companion in stripping him, rubbing him, and using the customary means to procure a resuscitation. The poor man was recovered, and Alexander gave him a sum of money. Upon his companion his Majesty settled a pension for life, as a reward for his active benevolence.

Several anecdotes of a similar nature have been related to us by the gentleman we have referred to, about none of which can we discover a single circumstance that would justify the slightest suspicion of an ostentatious motive, or that would even warrant an opinion that Alexander had the least reason to think his beneficence was ever likely to become known to the world.

Of such an ally England has reason to be proud, and such an enemy France has equal reason to dread. For in a war in which Alexander is likely to engage, he will carry with him the good wishes and confidence of the intelligent, and the good of all nations. together with the powerful and active support of one of the most numerous and martial populations that it has ever fallen to the lot of a man to reign over. The coincidence of such a Prince as Alexander, in the views of England, is one of the highest and most honorable testimonies that can be adduced in its favor, and one of the best omens that can offer of its ultimate success.
