

That they were principally committed at the direction of Alexander Hamilton, an eminent lawyer, who could not, as Wilkinson perhaps to a certain extent might, plead ignorance of the law in justification.

That they were committed at places incomparably more free from danger than that apprehended at New-Orleans.

That the blood of innocent unoffending men was spilt.

That several of these violations of law took place, although a federal Judge was present with the army, who was above all suspicion of being concerned in the insurrection.

That the privilege of the writ of Habeas Corpus was actually suspended, not merely, while the accused was on his passage from one place to another, but for months afterwards at the then seat of the general government.

These circumstances are adduced as proofs either of the correctness of the proceeding in the insurrection of 1784, or of the recent proceedings at New-Orleans; but to show that, at emergencies of imminent peril, real or apprehended, the regular course of justice is frequently obstructed or abandoned; and also to show that measures were pursued under General Washington, the purity of whose motives are not questioned, which infringed the civil authority to a much greater extent than those taken by Wilkinson.
