

ders in the country some gratification to learn the manner in which this news was received by the inhabitants of Newbern. Never did indignation appear more conspicuous, than on the countenance of every individual; that spirit of revenge which is occasioned by deep injury and insult, was professed by all, and one sentiment dictated the course to be pursued. Exertions on the part of the Editors were used that might lay before the inhabitants a detailed account of the melancholy catastrophe, with the resolutions entered into on that subject at Norfolk, which was done early next morning. It was only necessary to suggest the propriety of calling a meeting—it was the unanimous desire of the citizens. On Monday morning at 10 o'clock, a vast concourse of the inhabitants assembled at the Church, and unanimously adopted the preceding Resolutions.

NEW-YORK, JULY 3.

The patriotism and unanimity displayed at the different Town Meetings, called in consequence of the cowardly and inhuman attack of the British ship of war Leopard on the United States Frigate Chesapeake, must be peculiarly grateful to the feelings of every American. It will prove to our enemies and to the world, that however we may be divided on local considerations, we will, when the moment of danger arrives, or when the honor of the country is insulted and its laws set at defiance, cordially unite for the common defence. We hope the spirit of the people will be communicated to their Administration, and that they will adopt measures at once vigorous, honorable and effective.

The unanimous election of two gentlemen of different politics to fill the offices of Chairman and Secretary to the Meeting held in the Park yesterday, is a proof of the sincere desire of all to sacrifice on the altar of patriotism every political animosity, & cheerfully to co-operate with the nation at large in their determination to resist aggression, from whatever quarter it may come.

The following is a copy of the letter addressed by the officers of the wardroom of the Chesapeake, to the Secretary of the Navy.

Late U. S. ship Chesapeake, Hampton Roads, June 23, 1807.

The undersigned, officers of the late U. S. ship Chesapeake, feeling deeply sensible of the disgrace which must be attached to the late (in their opinion) premature surrender of the U. S. ship Chesapeake of 40 guns, to the English ship of war Leopard of 50 guns, without their previous knowledge, or consent, and desirous of proving to their country and the world, that it was the wish of all the undersigned, to have rendered themselves worthy of the flag under which they had the honor to serve, by a determined resistance, to an unjust demand, do request the hon. Secretary of the Navy to order a court of enquiry into their conduct. At the same time they are compelled by imperious duty, by the honor of their flag, by the honor of their countrymen and by all that is dear to themselves to request that an order may be issued for the arrest of Commodore James Barron on the charges herewith exhibited which the undersigned pledge themselves to prove true, viz.

1st. On the probability of an engagement, for neglecting to clear his ship for action.

2dly. For not doing his utmost to take or destroy a vessel which we conceive it his duty to have done.
