Entract of a Letter from a gentleman in Charles-ton, to his friend in this Town, dated Ju-15th 1807.

You have doubtless heard with indignation of the outrage committed by the British ship of War Leopard, on the United States frigate Chesapeake, which has agitated the whole continent. It has wrought upon the feelings of the people here to such a degree that the consequences were likely to be serious. Among the resolutions entered into by the committee of Charleston, was one that the citizens wear crape on the left arm for ten days, as a mark of respect for the memory of their countrymen slaughtered on board the Chesapeake. In deri-ion of this Resolve a Scotchman tied a trape round his dog's leg and turned him into the Street. The citizens inceused at the insult, caught the Scotch rascal about 7 o'clock in the morning, and took him to the pumps in front of the Guard house, and gave him a public cooling-Thus encouraged mobs rose in different parts of the city, and every one that said or did any thing derogatory to the government underwent the same operation, till at length some of the most wealthy and popular men, and even the Intendant, was threatened. They have been obliged to order out the Militia at nights, to keep order.
