Extract of a Letter from a gentleman in Charleston, to his friend in this Town, dated July 15th 1807.

You have doubtless heard with indignation of the outrage committed by the British ship of War Leopard, on the United States frigate Chesapeake, which has agitated the whole continent. It has wrought upon the feelings of the people here to such a degree that the consequences were likely to be serious. Among the resolutions entered into by the committee of Charleston, was one that the citizens wear crape on the left arm for ten days, as a mark of respect for the memory of their countrymen slaughtered on board the Chesapeake. In derision of this Resolve a Scotchman tied a trap round his dog's leg and turned him into the Street. The citizens incensed at the insult, caught the Scotch rascal about 7 o'clock in the morning, and took him to the pumps in front of the Guard house, and gave him a public cooling—This encouraged mobs rose in different parts of the city, and every one that said or did any thing derogatory to the government underwent the same operation, till at length some of the most wealthy and popular men, and even the Intendant, was threatened. They have been obliged to order out the Militia at night, to keep order.

On the Anniversary of our grand National Festival, the 4th of July, a few Republicans of Sampson County convened, and in the utmost harmony and conviviality passed the auspicious day.—The following toasts, with the subjoined music, gave unanimity, peace and patriotism complete sovereignty in their hearts.

1st. The day we solemnize—May every return of the grand epoch reanimate the soul of Americans, and give energy to the cause of Independence. *Gods of the Greeks.*

2d. The memory of those sage patriots who gave birth to Independence, and of those magnanimous heroes who guaranteed its birthright. *Gen. Green's March.*

3d. The memory of the illustrious Gen. Washington, his country's guardian, chief and saviour. *Hail Columbia.*

4th. The constitution of the United States—Freedom and peace to its real friends—exportation to its enemies. *Maggie Lander.*

5th. The citizens of the United States—may they accord in political sentiments, and undivided, mingle in the grand vortex of Republicanism. *Tankoe Dulle.*

6th. Liberty—May fostering zephyrs waft thy banner to earth's remotest verge, and give thy influence to all the living world. *Rural Felicity.*

7th. The Philosopher of Monticello—God-like in wisdom, and man's chief friend—*Salvator papali et fons lucis. Jefferson and Liberty.*

8th. Monroe—our next President—neither Fed nor Quid, but a patriot of the school of '76, and high priest of the temple of prudence. *Anarchron in Heaven.*

9th. The infant manufactures of Columbia—Fostering sales to their smiling aspect—annihilation to that power, that would nip their bud in embryo.

10. Agriculture—The wealth of the world, and life of its citizens. *Come each Josiah fellow.*

11th. Commerce—May its laws be meliorated by the law of nations, and its charter be extended to—neutral ships make free goods. *America, Commerce, and Freedom.*

12th. Erin—A speedy restoration of peace to thy bosom, a tear to thy sufferings—thy sons have been oppressed by an American—they are welcome, thrice welcome to our shores. *Erin go Bragh.*

13th. Perpetual infamy be entailed upon him, who, to revenge disappointed ambition, or to gratify insatiable thirst for power, would light the torch of civil discord, and involve his country in ruin. *Go to the devil and shake yourself.*

14th. Revolution to that state, where sanctioning fraud curbs the reins of truth, and unprincipled despotism triumphs in the garb of sound and steady principles. *Old 100th.*

15th. Selick Osborn—The victim of federal tyranny—thou sufferest not in vain—the history of thy wrongs shall diffuse the spirit of enquiry among deluded thousands. *The Grinder.*

16. British Navy—Palsey to her seamen, and decomposition to her metal, when inimical to neutral rights. *Galley slave.*

17th. Eternal thirst and starvation to that

man, who would manacle the child of labor with insatiable taxation, or strictures of birth-right—may he in torment, want a drop of water to cool his tongue. *Says Plato, &c.*

18th. The Daughters of Columbia—Heaven's in your eye, victory in your smile, be ye but patrons of Liberty and we are invincible. *Ma chere ami.*

He is a Guinea born negro, and has retained a good deal of the new negro accent, he is a strong clumsy made fellow about 5 feet 6 or seven inches high, very clumsy about the feet and legs, very slovenly in his dress, goes in all weathers, generally with his shirt collar and jacket unbuttoned—he is very tricky, and very plausible and coxing when he has any favor to ask, and is apparently pleased and in good humour till he obtains his end, and when he laughs shows his teeth to great advantage which are very white, he seldom combs his hair, generally lowly and is much inclined to go dirty, no certain description can be given as to his clothing, as before he went away he swindled a negro belonging to a vessel out of three dollars in money & some goods under the promise of buying him fowls for them, with which money and goods he will probably get himself new clothed—it is not apprehended that he is gone to sea, therefore from the date hereof all masters of vessels are cautioned, against carrying him to sea, and all others white or black harbouring him.

Law of North-Carolina,  
Passed in the year 1801.

CHAP. XVI.  
An Act to amend an Act entitled "An Act directing a method of electing members of the General Assembly, and other purposes, passed in the year 1777."

II. BE it enacted, That every person elected a Member of the General Assembly, shall, before taking his seat therein take the oath of allegiance appointed for the qualification of members of the General Assembly and Public Officers, and also to support the Constitution of the United States. And if any person elected a Member of the General Assembly, shall, by himself or any other person, directly or indirectly give, or cause to be given, any gift, gratuity, reward or present whatever; or give or cause to be given by himself, or any other person, any treat or entertainment either by himself or any other person for him, of meat or drink, at any public meeting or collection of the people, to any person or persons whatever, for his or their vote or votes, or to influence him or them in his election, every person violating this act, shall, on due proof thereof be expelled from his seat in the General Assembly.

III. Be it further enacted, That if any person or persons shall treat with either meat or drink, on days of election, or any day previous thereto, with an intent to influence the election, every person so offending shall forfeit and pay the sum of one hundred pounds, the one half for the use of the county where the same shall be recovered; to be paid to the County Trustee; the other half to the use of the person who shall sue for the same; to be recovered by action of debt in any court of record having cognizance thereof, with costs.
