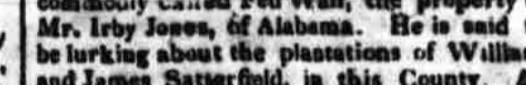

Of Water Proof Lime.

Germantown, August 15, 1820.
DEAR SIR,
 On my return from the Falls of Niagara, I descended the Great Canal, from Auburn to Utica, and had frequent opportunities of examining the aqueducts and locks, in the construction of which the "water proof lime" is found to subservise so valuable a purpose.—Several gentlemen of intelligence, employed in superintending those works, assured me that masonry, where this lime was used, could not be taken down without blasting, and the singular hardness of those portions of the mortar which I examined, under water, induced me to credit what I heard with regard to its importance in hydraulic architecture. The property of hardening under water is that which constitutes the great value of this species of lime; but Judge Wright and Dr. Barton (to whom we are indebted for the application of it to the construction of locks and aqueducts) think
