#### From the Essex Reg ster.

The public execution of Stephen Merrill Clark, took place in this town on Thursday, 10 h inst. and surely a scene more solemn, impressive and affecting, never was exhibited in this commonwealth. It is impossible to give adequate expression to the deep and awful feelings to which the memorable transactions of the day gave

At an early hour the place of execution was literally surrounded by anxious multitudes, waiting the arrival of the foral moment that was to consign offe of their fellow mortals to an untimely grave ; their eyes now fixed on the instrument of death before them, and now turned in that direction where the funeral escort of the unha ppy criminal was expected to appear in sight. - Soon the mournful procession met their view, and was seen slowly winding its way to the fatal spot, preceded and accompanied by additional multitudes of speciators; and at about half post one it haked just whithout the area on which the gallows stood. In a few moments the peace officers commanded an opening to be made through the crowd, and the young & interesting object of universal attention & commi seration was led into the spacebut oh, how changed from that sturdy, robust, and apparently uncon-cerned youth, who, but a few weeks before, was tried, convicted, and sentenced to suffer death. Then his countenance was flushed and ruddy with he glow of health; his eye was

quick and snimated, his perves unshaken by the array and circumstance of judicial proceedings, and his whole frame was firm and strung. Now a ghastly paleness covered his face, his eye was languid and declined to earth; his aspect bespoke an inward grief and agony, that could not be uttered, and as the Rev. Clergymen supported his feeble steps towards the scaffold, his very soul appeared to quake at the

terrors of the law that surrounded him. He was conducted up the first flight of steps to the principal floor; and here the agony of his spirit plmost overpowered his strength, and he was near fainting, but was in some measure revived by the kind and assiduous attention of those about him, and he leared upon his spiritual guides while the high-sheriff read the warrant for his execution. A profound and solemn silence reigned throughout the vast multitude of speciators whose countenances were marked by feelings of the despest interest, and who remained uncovered during the residue of the tragic scene. The Rev. Cornelius then read the dying words of the hapless youth, and the Rev. Mr. Carlile addressed the throne of Heavenly mercy in his behalf : after which the attendants joined in prayer with the prisoner alone .- This service being ended, the Rev. Clergy. men took their last, affectionate leave of their charge, and left him in the hands of the executive officers .- The tender solicitude manifes ed toward the unhappy sufferer by the humane and morthy sheraff of the county, was scargely less than that which marked and when he assembled the fight of steps and took his stand upon his last support, the sympathics and pity of the beholders were raised to the highest pitch ; and when his bosom and his neck were bared and he ily inclined his head, to enable Mr. Brown to adjust the fatal cord, and submissively placed himself in the position most convenient for the readful purpose for which he was brought there, the feelings of the multitude could no longer be suppressed, and mingled sighs and grouns were heard in every direction. These pre-parations were soon adished, and at a signal from the high sheriff, the spring was touched, and Clark was in a moment laquehed into eternity. Thus died Stephen Merrill Clark, aged 17 years-cut off in the morning of his life, for a heinous offence, and made a terrible example of the getribution of the present world, and held up as in awful warning to all survivors, and especially to young persons, to shun the paths of vice. May the warning not be lost.
