and the Angles of Revenge Caftle are almoft entirely ruined. The Volcana Popenberg caft up ftones of prodigious Size, which deftroyed Abundance of Spice Plantations. The Shock was as violent at Nigria towards the Sea, but the Damage was not fo confiderable. The Earthquake was lefs violent in the Ifles of Piczang and Roozengain. Mount GoenoengApy crumbled down in feveral Places, and is much funk.
"Though our prefent Condition is very difmal, yet no more than feven Perfons have perifhed in this Difafter. The Houfes are not tenantable, fo that moft of the People live in Tents; but as the Earth ftill quakes, and we hear a Noife under Ground like the Firing of Cannon at a Diftance, we fear there will be Occafion to give a fad Supplement to this Account."

- On Monday Lord Clive was fworn before the Court of Directors of the Hon. Eaft India Company, Commander in Chief of the Company's Forces in India.

It is hoped the Account of the Mafficre of the Prifoners in the Eaft Indies will not prove true, as it is onlymentioned in private Letters, and the Company have-no Advice of it.

It is computed that the Damage fuftained by the Eaif India Company in the late violent Hurricane in Madrafs Road, amounts to little Short of one Million Sterling.
Venice, 'Fune 8. On Wednefday the 3oth pait, the Magiffrates of the Razon Vecchia fent his R ayal Highnefs the Duke of York the Compliment ufually made to foreign Princes here, of a large Service of Glafs fur a Defert, and of W ax in a Variety of Forms of Birds, Fruits, Flowers, 8ec, to which was adeed a Beaureau of very extraordinary Workmanfhip. On the Afcention Day his Royal Highnefs went to the Palace to fie the Banquet, prepared for the Doge and the Signoria; and was afterwards conducted in a fine Barge and entertained by the noble Deputies at Murano at Dinner ; to which all the Englifh of Diltine. tion, and many Venetian Noblemen and Ladies were invited. In the Afternoon his Roy. al Highnefs took the Diverfion in the Barge upon the $W$ ater, where there was a very great Concourfe of People of Diftinctions in Condolas and other Barges. On Suncay lait his Royal Highnefs was conducted by the Deputies in a fine Barge, to fee the Ceremony of the Doge's going in the Becentoro, attended by a
great Number of Nobles to efpoufe the Adriatic Sea. This Solemnity is always performed upon Afcention-Day, when the Weather permits. In the Evening his Royal Highnefs was pleafed to go to the Hofpital of the Mendicarti, and was entertained there with a Concert of vocal and inftrumental Mufic, performed by the Girls of that Hifpital.
Fune 23. The Treaty concluded at Peterfburg between the Emprefs of Ruffia and King of Pruffia, on the 1 Ith of April, is in Subfance as follows:

By Articles I. and II. a Treaty of defenfive Aliance, and a mutual Guaranty are agreed to; after referving the Liberty of concluding other Treaties not contrary to the prefent.
III.-IX. In Cafe of a foreign Attack, 10,000 Infantry, and 2000 Cavalry, are promifed, three Monihs after the firff Requiftion, to be continued till a Ceffation of Hoftilities. If thefe are not fufficient, Means to be concertto employ additional Force. The Troops to be paid and furnifhed with Ammunition by the Party afififing: Provilions and Quarters to be furnifhed by the affifted. . The Troops to receive Orders from their own General, and to have their own Riligion and Laws.
X. No Piece, \&c. to be concluided without mutual Confent.
XI. In Cafe of War on the Part of the affifting Party, it thall be exempted from furnifhing its Quota, or fhatl be at Liberty to withdraw its Forces, after two Monchs Notice.
XII. A free Commerce betwen the two States.
XIII. XIV. The Treaty to be in Force eight Years, and renewable before the Expiration, according to Circumitances. Ratifications to be exchanged in fix Weeks.

By a fecret Article it is engaged to maintan Poland in its Right of a free Election, and to prevent all hereditary Succeffion.

The Spanilh Ambaffador, as far as he can confiftently do it till he hears from the King bis Mafter, condemns and difavows the Proceecings' of the Spanifh Governor, in Refpict to the fetters in the Bay of Honduras.
