Naples, July 21,

RE AT Numbers of unhappy
Objects still continuing to die
in the Houses and Streets,
whose Bodies infect the Air;
to obviate this Inconveniency,
new Hospitals have been erect-
ed to receive all poor Objects, supported by
publick Subscription, set on Foot by some
Ladies of high Rank. Since these prudent
Precautions, the Number of dead People,
which amounted before to 500 in a Day, is
reduced to 130; which, though a great Num-
ber, it must be considered that the Inhabitants
of this City are computed from 370,000 to
380000, and that these were considerably en-
creased by the great Number of Poor, whom
the Fear of Famine forced hither from the
neighbouring Provinces for Relief.

Cadiz, July 17. According to a Letter
from Sallee of the 22d last, the King of Mo-
rocco has come to a Resolution of making
Mogador his principal Sea-Port, where all his
Corsairs will be obliged to arm and disarm,
and accordingly has caused the said Port to be
fortified in the most advantageous Manner
possible. The Direction of these Works, as
well as those of the Isle of Morgador has been
confided to a Neapolitan Slave, who was sent
for that Purpose to the Emperour by the Dey
of Algier. It is now ten Months since he has
begun to labour there at the Head of three
hundred Men, of whom no more than fifty at
present remain. He has caused the Passage
from the South of the Isle to be filled up, leav-
ing there only a small Opening. Some even

assure that he has shut it up entirely. He has
also raised on the North Side of the Isle a Kind
of a Fort, the Cannon of which, twenty-four
Pounders, cross those of the old Battery and of
a new Fort of the same Weight of Metal erect-
ed on the Point of the Continent, to the North
of the Bey, and directly opposite the Fortifi-
cation which is on the Isle. By Means of
these Labours, the Enterance into the Port
on the North of the Isle will be defended, and
the Vessels which shall anchor be entirely shel-
tered from bad Weather. Exclusively of the
Workmen who have been employed on these
Works, the King of Morocco has also sent to
Mogador two hundred Families, who are to
settle there.
