on shore. The magistrates, as soon as they had notice, sent to disperse the mob, and secure the boat, but the business was finished before they could interpose. The Court met in the afternoon, but were not able to discover any of the persons concerned in the mischief.

IV I L M I NG TO N November 14, 1764. This Day the sum of nine thousand one hundred and twenty pounds ten shillings and nine-pence, Proclamation Money and Notes, from the sinking Fund, was burnt, in presence of a Committee of both bouses of Assembly.

NEWBERN, November 23.

The Hon. Col. TRYAN, our Lieutenant Governor, we hear, intends to make a Tour thro' the Province; and is shortly expected here, on his Way to the Northward.
