Meeting Called For Sunday
At the invitation of the three men ejected from the hall on last Friday evening a mass meeting has been called for Sunday afternoon at 3 o'clock at which time the treatment which the organizer inflicted on them will be discussed.
A letter from E. Louis Evans, who is president, Secretary and Treasurer of the Tobacco Worker's International Union, and whose office is located in Louisville, Kentucky stated, contrary to the statement made by the local organizer, that there was no held in the headquarters against Mr. Tapp and Mr. Pemberton.

The degenerate attack on the 20-year-old girl has aroused tremendous indignation among the Negro residents. One worker, who declined to permit the use of his name for obvious reasons, said: "If such a thing as this had happened to a white woman, no matter who the guilty person was no Negro man in Texas would be safe from lynching. What happened to this woman is always happening to Negro women and nothing is done about it."

The letter also stated that the charter granted the colored union organization several years ago was revoked because Cobb and others advocated policies contrary to the well being of the people and "opposed to the established policies of" the union.
When interviewed this week Mr. Cobb stated that he and others had objected to splitting up the tobacco workers into separate unions, and that they had insisted on there being one organization, the same as that maintained by the white tobacco workers, but those organizing wanted three separate organizations apparently for the purpose of keeping all the colored tobacco workers weak and powerless.
Several interesting speakers have been invited to the Sunday afternoon meeting, and it is thought that there will be a large crowd on hand to hear the discussions, as well as the speeches.

saved and held with the race and many more thousands of homes and other types of personal property have been conserved and held with the possession of the race by virtue of loans which have been made from this reservoir. It is also interesting to note that the officials of these companies recognize the fact that the bulk of the business on their books comes from the most underprivileged group of the American body politic, and have been most considerate in the allocation of their invested funds in that they have to some extent exceeded the proper ratio in mortgage loans. During 1936, beneficiaries and policy holders through death claims, cash surrenders, and matured endowments, were receiving from these companies more than six and a half million dollars and in all probability there was an additional one and a quarter million dollars that went to the policy holders by virtue of loans for which their policy contracts as sole security for money.
These companies during 1936, also maintained a payroll to its employees of more than \$5,000,000. They paid to Negro physicians for professional services during the year over \$100,000 and through advertising mediums newspapers and printing establishments, more than \$100,000. It might also be well to point out here that in addition to those 12,000 salesmen on the field are approximately 3,000 additional employees in the home offices of these various companies.
The National Association contemplates making awards for the accomplishments of the leading 102 best and most outstanding salesmen of the 12,000 who will be participating during that week. These awards will consist of two very beautiful trophies—one to be given to the leading ordinary producer of the nation and the other to the leading industrial producer. Ten very beautiful bronze vest pins will be awarded to the ten ordinary producers who are leaders and 90 of the same type of pins will be awarded to the leading industrial producers. These trophies and pins will represent an effort on the part of the Association to give national recognition to the 102 agents who do the best jobs on this occasion, recognition to the 102 agents who do the best jobs on this occasion.

would not accept accommodations. Upon such a decision Dr. McCrorey, decreed that the team and all parts thereof leave the premises of his domains immediately; which necessitated our packing and leaving amid a typical spring down-pour. While we were leaving the students were filing into the Dining Hall for lunch, after their debating society came out and stated that it had been granted that four could eat lunch in the Dining Hall, which meant that all could eat with the exception of myself. To this the members of our team quickly replied that they would starve first.
I was amazed to read Dr. McCrorey's telegram to you stating that he did not order the team off the campus. Such a deliberate and malicious attempt to distort the truth of the matter should bring the condemnation of all.
The truth of the matter is that first he sent Mr. Bond to inform us that our entertainment was to cease at once, and secondly, he delivered this edict himself. His last lines of the telegram, "but nothing unfavorable to Howard's team as a whole," has me at a loss to determine whether it was meant for sarcasm or an attempt at an explanation. To me it is like someone out of your home and then explaining to them that there is no hard feeling between you two. He stated to us time and time again that he was the President of Johnson C. Smith University, (those of us who know his wife might wonder as to the factual veracity of this statement), and as such ran the school as his divine conscious so ordained; in his dismissal of Professor Bond he has gone a long way to prove this. I am sure that we all sympathize with this unfortunate professor because he has reaped the vengeance, like others before him both students and professors, of this autocratic and dictatorial fascist regime in the mockery of "Higher Christian Education."

tinue so long as Negro men and women place monetary value above the souls and lives of their children. It will continue so long as Negro leaders want to lead without paying the price of leadership. Negroes in North Carolina can, if they will, save their white friends from the results of a guilty conscience, from the results of having to live with a people after knowing they have mistreated them. For after all it is the conscience of the white man that makes him distasteful to Negroes who uncover his misdeeds. After all it is he that is being raped of his noble purpose, his faith and his love of all mankind. It is his conscience, his soul that are going to be left a bleeding mass of spiritual wreckage. When Negroes of importance look far enough and deep enough they will see that the saving of one race in North Carolina cannot be obtained without the saving of the other.
The Negro has tried love, faithfulness, kindness, hope, sympathy and every other noble sentiment. Indeed his patience and ability to smile under most trying circumstances has been the admiration of the world. But even iron will eventually wear out. The Carolina Times recommends that he try that great document worship and cherished through the ages by such statesmen and defenders as Carter Glass, Wardman, Tillman, Cole, Bleasie and Furnifold Simmons. As a last resort to obtain peacefully what is rightfully his, we recommend that the United States Supreme Court be called upon to interpret again the constitutional rights of the Negro and what is meant by SEPARATE BUT EQUAL ACCOMODATIONS.
