Negroes in North Carolina can, if they will, save their white friends from the results of a guilty conscience, from the results of having to live with a people after knowing they have mistreated them. For after all it is the conscience of the white man that makes him distasteful of Negroes who uncover his misdeeds. After all it is he that is being raped of his noble purpose, his faith and his love of all mankind. It is his conscience, his soul that are going to be left a bleeding mass of spiritual wreckage. When Negroes of importance look far enough and deep enough they will see that the saving of one race in North Carolina cannot be obtained with-

out the saving of the other. The Negro has tried love, faithfulness, kindness, hope sympathy and every other noble sentiment. Indeed his his patience and ability to smile under most trying circumstances has been the admiration of the world. But even iron will eventually wear out, The Carelina Times recommends that he try that great document worship and cherished through the ages by such statemen and defenders as Carter Glass, Vardman, Tillman, Cole Blease and Furnifold Simmons.
