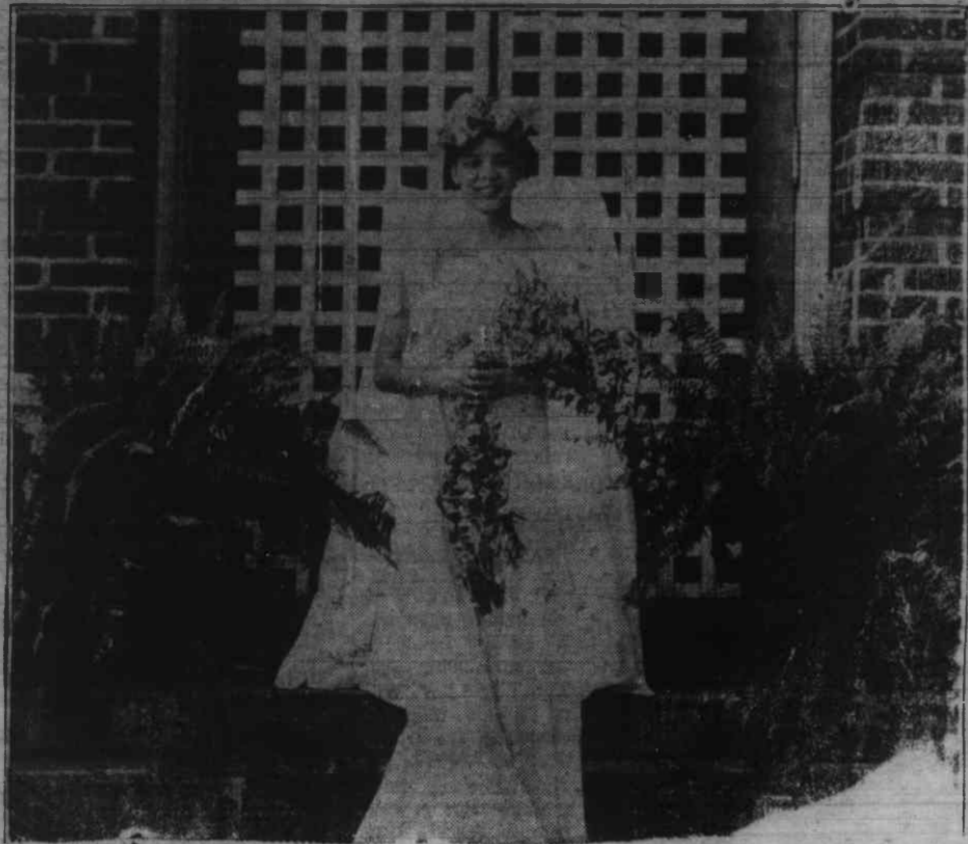

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## To Our Seven Thousand Graduates, GREETINGS

(By C. C. Spaulding, President of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Co., Durham, N. C.)

During the next few weeks, about seven thousand young Negro men and women will leave college with diplomas to face the problems of life. A large number of these diplomas will certify that these young people have chosen a field and have completed courses that will fit them to take over positions such as accountants, bookkeepers, salesmen, and stenographers. These students represent the dream of some investor, who many years ago realized the value of investing money in the education of these young people.

Now, these students, as well as the parents and colleges, are out looking for fitting jobs, whereby they can put into practice some of the things they have learned in school. Past records show that a very few of these young Negro graduates will be placed in organizations such as newspapers publishing houses, banks, insurance companies, gasoline stations and grocery stores for which they have been trained unless the organizations are managed or owned by our race. This indisputable fact means simply this—The Negro Youth Needs Negro Business and Negro business Needs Negro Youth.

Our capitalistic society is based upon our ability to expand into new fields such as shop repair shops, moving picture houses, theatres, and many other lines of business, or to operate on a larger scale our present set-ups. Thus, when we are able to double or triple our newspaper circulation, double or triple the number of insurance policies in force, double, triple our banks deposits, and double or triple our grocery stores the employment of Negroes in business likewise is increased in relative proportion thereby absorbing an increasingly larger number of these graduates.
