SURPRISE APPLE CAKE

—a de luxe dessert that's really easy!
2 tablespoons butter, melted
1-2 teaspoon cinnamon
2 cups graham cracker crumbs
3 eggs, separated
1 1-3 cups (1 can) Eagle Brand Sweetened Condensed Milk
2 tablespoon lemon juice
Grated rind of 1 lemon
2 cups canned or drained, sieved apple sauce
