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Gov. Frank Murphy Will Present Spingarn Medal To Walter White

New York, June 4.—As one of the highlights of the 28th annual conference of the N. A. A. C. P., which meets in Detroit, Mich., June 29-July 4, Governor Frank Murphy of Michigan will formally present the twenty-third Spingarn medal to Walter White on the evening of July 2.

The presentation will have an historical significance because it was in Detroit that Mr. White and the then Judge Frank Murphy first became acquainted. Judge Murphy presided at the famous Sweet trial and throughout the long weeks of that trial became acquainted with the work of the N. A. A. C. P. and with its executives. Shortly thereafter he became a member of the board of directors of the N. A. A. C. P. and has occupied that position ever since.

The youth section of the N. A. C. P. will have a conference at the same time and at least 500 delegates are expected to register for it. The young people will have a special radio broadcast July 1, a dinner for the youth delegates, and after the evening mass meeting at which the problems of youth will be considered, they will have a dance for the guests.

One of the important discussion groups at the business sessions of the conference will be that on education which will be led by Doxey A. Wilkerson of the faculty of Howard university. Mr. Wilkerson has been active in the fight against educational inequalities and was prominent in the movement to amend the Harrison-Black-letcher bill which provided federal aid to the states for education. He and Dr. Charles H. Thompson of Howard are considered the leading authorities in this field. Other topics to be discussed at the conference include disfranchisement, relief and social security, lynching, Scottsboro case, and the Negro worker and the C. I. O.

Other speakers at the conference mass meeting will include J. E. Spingarn, president of the N. A. A. C. P., who will speak on Thursday night, July 1; and Dr. Robert C. Weaver of the Interior Department who will speak Wednesday night, June 30.

The conference sessions, which are expected to attract 1,000 delegates, will be held at Ebenezer M. E. church, corner Willis and Brush streets. I. C. Blount, president of the Detroit branch of the N. A. A. C. P., and a number of committees are hard at work on the final arrangements for the meeting.

MARYLAND COURT GETS TEACHERS' SALARY CASE

Rockville, Md., June 4.—The circuit court here will hear the case of Gibbs vs. the Board of Education of Montgomery county, June 9 to consider for the first time the wide difference in salaries paid Negro and white teachers.

William B. Gibbs, Jr., on December 31, 1936, filed his petition for a writ of mandamus alleging that he was a regular teacher-principal in the Rockville colored elementary school and was paid pursuant to the schedule of salaries adopted by the Board of Education. He alleged that white teachers with the same qualifications and experience had doing the same work are paid \$1125 a year.
