It does a fighter no good to leave his fight in his training camp, and Jack Blackburn is seeing to it that his boy doesn't leave his at Kenosha, Wis.

Instead of letting Joe lambast his sparmates out of the ring like he did in preparation for Schmeling, Blackburn is making the Bomber pay more attention to his defense. He has the Bomber weaving under rights and using counter punches. Blackburn is slowly working Joe up to the physical peak, you will find him in Tuesday night.

Whites Sue Harry Pace For \$100,000

Sue to Prevent His Occupying Home In Exclusive District

Chicago, June 18. — (ANP)—Suit for \$100,000 was filed against Harry H. Pace, president of the Supreme Liberty Life Insurance Company and nationally known business and fraternal executive, in the circuit court here Monday, by whites of the Washington Park district, an exclusive residential section into which Mr. Pace and his family recently moved. Mr. Pace is preparing to defend himself against the suit which is sponsored by a group of white protective associations notoriously inimical to the best interests of Negroes.

These whites who live immediately east of the colored district on Chicago's south side, have sought through the years to prevent the further encroachment of Negroes upon the territory which they occupy. Restrictive covenants signed by a majority of property owners and prohibiting colored people from buying or living in property east of Cottage Grove have been in existence for years. Other agreements govern the territory west of Cottage Grove, extending along 60 street, the south side of Chicago's famous Washington Park to South Parkway, the main artery of the Negro section, and south to 63rd street. Similar covenants are in effect in most of the desirable residential district in Chicago and are growing rapidly in other cities throughout the country. Negroes in Chicago thus find themselves hemmed into the so-called "black belt."

Mr. Pace purchased the property at 411 E. 60th street two months ago and after extensive alterations moved in with his family. He was thoroughly aware of the situation surrounding the covenants but elected to become the spearhead of the fight to open up the district to Negro ownership.

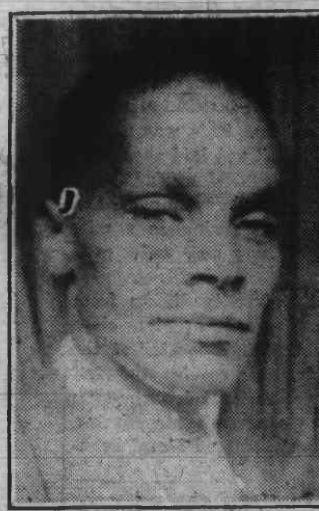
Retaliation of the whites was swift. Suit was filed for \$100,000, alleging damages to residents of the district through violation of the covenant. A bill in equity was also filed which seeks to force him to move from the home which he has purchased. Mr. Pace, determined to fight the issue to a conclusion, has retained a group of the ablest lawyers in Chicago, Earl B. Dickerson, Joseph D. Bibb, Irving C. Mollison and Truman K. Gibson, Jr., being his attorneys in the case.

"I am standing upon my inalienable rights as an American citizen," said Mr. Pace Friday, when seen by an ANP reporter. "The vicious tendency," he continued, "to consign Negroes to ghettos and inferior neighborhoods must be broken up. We have the right as any other citizen to have our homes in favorable sections and to take advantage of the superior services invariably given there."

"I am not seeking to live among white people. Colored people are residing within a stone's throw of my new residence, but are prohibited by law from moving across the arbitrary line which these inimical and iniquitous associations have set up. I do not believe the courts will support a program which seeks to deprive a citizen of the right to live wherever he desires and is able to live."

Says Churches Controlled By Business Men

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (C)—One of the most amazing charges in the history of Negro religion and business was made editorially here last week by the Rev. R. C. Barbour, in the National Baptist Voice, official organ of the National Baptist Convention of America, when he declared: "Something new is happening in our churches. Recently, six of our distinguished pastors have been forced out of their churches by loan and insurance companies, investment and other business concerns . . . We must keep in mind that eighty per cent of our Baptist churches belong to bankers and loan companies. Prayers have a very little effect on the latter. God does not own our churches . . ."

"We lost the historic Beale St. Baptist Church, Memphis, several weeks ago. It was very simply done. The Supreme Liberty Life Insurance Company of Chicago hold a mortgage on the Beale Street Church. An official of the company met with the Memphis church in its official meeting. He gave this advice:—

"Call Pastor of Our Choice"

"If you will call a pastor of our choice, we will give you more time on your loan; if not, we will have to foreclose our loan."

"Rather than lose their church, the members of the Beale Street Church called a pastor from the Unincorporated Convention."

"Dr. B. J. Perkins, St. Louis pastor, and treasurer of the National Baptist Convention, had served the Memphis church for twenty-five years. He submitted his resignation in the interest of peace."

"When our churches are in the hands of unscrupulous bankers and business concerns, what else can they do other than accept their control and dictation?"

"The Beale Street Baptist Church will come back to us as soon as they can adjust their financial problems. At present they have no other choice than to follow the advice of the unethical business concern that has a mortgage on its physical property."

"New Strategy of Intimidation"

"This is the new strategy employed by our business leaders to disrupt and intimidate our churches. While we are talking about modernism and attempting to control the thought of our religious thinkers, our capitalistic gain is dominating our religious institutions. They have taken the place of the Holy Spirit. Think of a Negro business man, who, perhaps, is not a churchman, standing in a Baptist church-meeting, and naming a pastor."

"This is something to think about. No pastor who has a mortgage on his church is safe. He may be forced out at any time. Instead of wasting our energy on modernistic thought, it would be better if we could work out some kind of strategy which would get us out of the hands of unscrupulous business men."
