Louis Must Meet Schmeling Or Lose Crown

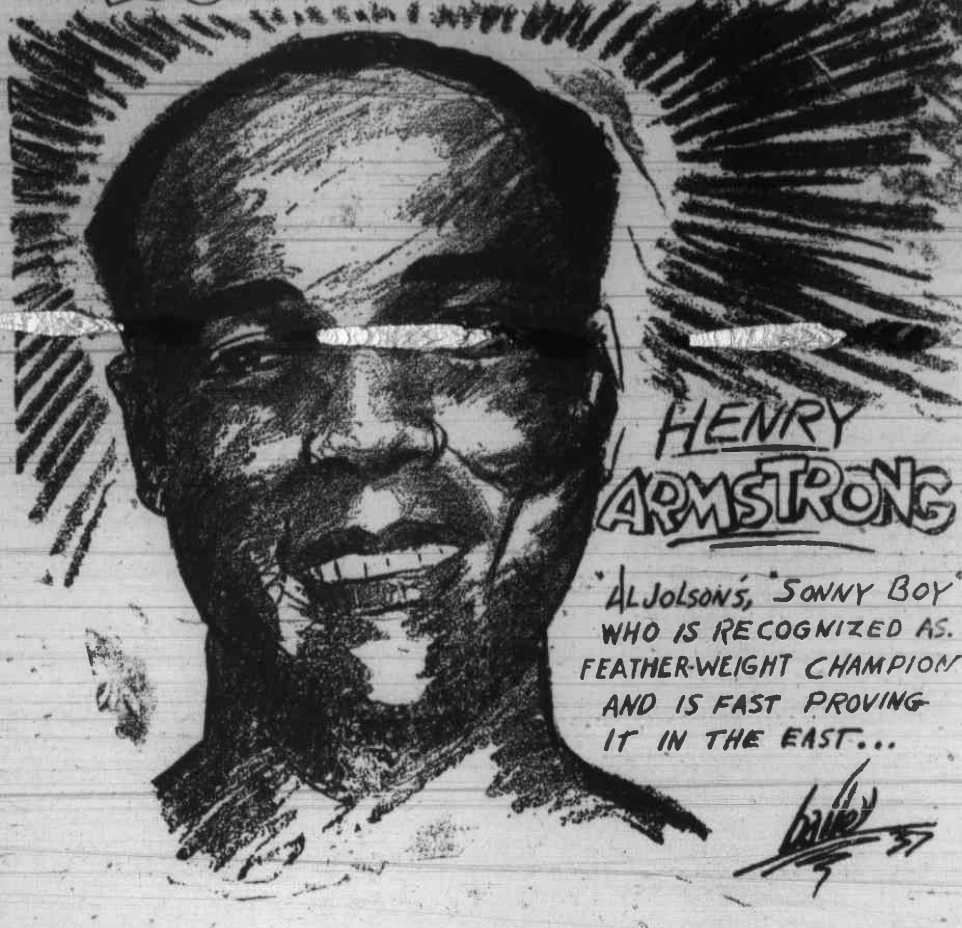

She's old, and her thin body hunches forward when she walks. Her yellow, unhealthy skin is taut over her high cheek-bones and she looks at you through small gray eyes. When you first see her, your heart is filled with sympathy, but as she gets closer to you, you see that she's drunk. At once pity gives way to disgust and you hurry on your way.

In fact it's so real it's painful. And what's more it's right here in our own city. Perhaps you have seen her. They call her "Little Bit", and when she isn't in jail or the County Home, she can be seen walking up and down the street in Mexico drunk, cursing and being cursed. She has become an addict to "drugs", and she'll do anything for a drink or a "shot" of "hop". When you look at "Little Bit" you see a woman stripped of her virtue. A woman whose self-respect has been lost in the struggle for an existence in a hard, cruel world that has no favorites. Men look upon her with disgust and women are ashamed of her because she is a member of their sex. You look at all of this and wonder what kind of driving force started her downfall.

"Little Bit" is only one of thousands of women and men throughout the United States who have weakened in the struggle and have faded into the background. Every city has these individuals, and as they crowd moves forward, they are left behind to tread the streets of "Forgotten Men"; where life is cheap. Where five cents will buy a cup of coffee and two stale doughnuts. Two-bits will buy a quart of whiskey that burns like fire and tastes like shoe polish.

You find all sorts traveling these streets. Panhandlers, bums, and derelicts of society; they all

travel together. Hating, fighting, loving, and killing. Sometimes one of them wants to get away from it all, but the effort is too much for him and he ends up in a gutter with a knife in his heart or a bullet through his head. That's where you find women like "Little Bit". That's how life is lived on the streets of "Forgotten Men".

Drums rolled, horns blared in a marching tune and the crowd surged forward. Thousands of Legionnaires, both white and black, marched down Main street with their banners flying, unmindful of the sheets of rain that drenched their bodies. A long Main Street spectators lined the sidewalks and heads were sticking out of windows to get a fair glimpse of the goily dressed Legionnaires.

The crowd yelled and cheered as the drum majors did their "stuff", while up in front the old "Bars and Stripes" rode in all its glory. In spite of the rain it was a swell parade and Durham was mighty proud to act as host to the American Legion. The Legionnaires march on.
