

W. DURHAM CHURCH PROGRESSING

Remarkable Growth Seen Since Organized



Above is the West Durham Baptist church which, during its forty-three years of existence, has shown remarkable progress. The West Durham Baptist church was organized in the autumn of the year 1892 by Rev. W. H. Standfield of Durham County. The first building was a one room box house on Ferrell Street. Since that time the church has shown steady improvement, until now it is a \$12,000 building. It was through the untiring efforts of the present pastor, Rev. T. C. Graham of north Wilkesboro, N. Carolina, that the church has reached its present status. Rev. Graham began his pastorate in

March 1921, and it was under his guidance that the \$12,000 building was constructed and paid for.

The most remarkable thing about the West Durham Baptist church is that during the year of 1924, when the building was completed and entered for worship, the church, through its members of less than 200, raised an amount more than \$4,000 without the aid of entertainments of any kind and without a single subscription list.

The West Durham Baptist church is located on Thaxton Ave. and always extends a hearty welcome to visitors.

200,000 WOMEN EMPLOYED IN YEAR ON WPA PROJECTS

WASHINGTON, July 30.—CNA—A larger number of Negro women were employed by the Works Progress Administration during the past fiscal year than any other single group.

Nearly 200,000, many the sole support of their families, were employed in sewing rooms, making garments for destitute families, in schools, preparing and serving noon-day meals to undernourished school children; conducting adult and vocational classes; in homes, providing temporary free assistance in housework and the care of children to needy mothers; in community centers, playgrounds, and parks supervising leisure-time activities; and on a variety of white-collar projects ranging from clerical work to the

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The largest number of these women worked in the thousands of sewing rooms scattered about every state in the country, and many of which have been recently discontinued as thousands of workers have been fired from the WPA list.

DR. HOLMES ACCEPTS MORGAN PRESIDENCY

BALTIMORE, July 30.—Dr. Dwight Oliver Wendell Holmes, dean of the Howard University Graduate School, who was elected president of Morgan College on June 22 by a unanimous vote of the trustees, has accepted. He will begin his new duties on September 1.

A native of Lewisburg, W. Va., Dr. Holmes received the A.M. from Howard in '01, A.M. in '12, and the A.M. from Columbia in '15. He has since received the Ph.D. from Columbia. Dr. Holmes taught in Sumner high school of St. Louis in '02, and in Douglas High of Baltimore from '02 to '17, then to Miner Normal two years, then to Howard, first as registrar for one year, then as dean of the College of Education.

NOTICE
New Milk Delivery Schedule Effective:
Sun. August 1st. 1937

BEGINNING SUNDAY, AUGUST 1st. ALL RETAIL DELIVERIES OF MILK WILL BE MADE AFTER 7:30 A.M.
This change in the time of delivering milk to the homes in Durham is made for two important reasons. The first has to do with the quality of milk and the second with the working conditions of milk salesmen who serve the public.

TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF MILK:
The early morning delivery of milk is a custom which is gradually being discontinued over the country because of the length of time the milk is on the customer's porch without refrigeration. Milk, which is a very perishable product, now remains on the porches from one to four hours before it is taken in. This seriously affects its flavor and keeping quality. This is recognized by all Health Departments and our local Health Department recommends that this condition be corrected. A forenoon delivery will allow the milk to be taken directly from the iced trucks to your refrigerator without delay.

TO IMPROVE EMPLOYEES WORKING CONDITIONS
The trend of the times is to improve the working conditions of employees. At the best a milk deliveryman has an unusual and difficult task. He reports for work from 2:00 to 3:00 o'clock in the morning in order to complete his rounds before breakfast. In addition he has to work on Sundays and Holidays. This unusual schedule deprives both himself and his family of a normal home life. Daylight delivery of milk will enable him to have the normal working hours enjoyed by others.

IN ADDITION TO THESE TWO ADVANTAGES
Of delivering milk AFTER breakfast instead of BEFORE breakfast it has been found in other cities that the public enjoys a better dairy service. The customer is able to see her milkman when he makes his rounds and can make or obtain her extra orders without delay, and can explain to him personally any changes she desired to make in her dairy deliveries. Forenoon deliveries will also eliminate the problem of stolen milk which is aggravating to the public and a matter of inconvenience and considerable expense to the dairymen.
