Tennessee Lynching Speeds Anti-Lynch Law Says Dailies

NEW YORK, Sept. 16—Editorial comment from large and small southern daily papers indicates that the lynching of Albert Gooden in Covington, Tenn., on August 17, is likely to be the unanswerable argument which will insure the passage of the federal anti-lynching bill early in the next session.

Some of the editorials, collected by the NAACP, follow: Montgomery (Ala.) Advertiser: "To hell with the law!"

Albany (Ga.) Herald: The anti-lynching bill has been sidetracked for the present session of Congress, but its supporters have won for it preferred legislative status when the Senate reconvenes. Its enactment by the present Congress is considered highly probable.

assured of consideration at the next session. Clarksville (Tenn.) Chronicle: The bitter controversy in the Senate over the anti-lynching bill appears to be unwarranted. If the bill passes, it will be a Federal crime for mobs to lynch wretched victims. Naturally, with Uncle Sam's G men moving in on a scene after a lynching, mobsters need not expect to escape.

But why shouldn't lynching be stopped, even at the expense of Uncle Sam moving in? Often innocent people are killed by mobs who demand blood and who become self-appointed officers, juries, judges, and executors. If we condone the mob, and wink at lynchers, regardless of what sector the crime occurs, we are admitting Democracy is a failure and courts are incapable of dealing with justice.

The lynching bill should not be interpreted as aiming directly at the South. There are lynchings elsewhere. Nor are all the result of racial strife. None should be condoned.

The masked gang had a cool and pat reply to the sheriff's plea that they respect the processes of law. They said "To hell with the law."

That puts at least this lynching where it belongs, catalogs it as a cold-blooded, deliberate crime. As such, it is roundly denounced by the public officials and civic leaders of Memphis.

The question arises: would such lynchings be likely to occur if they called out Federal police and subjected communities and states to special penalties? Perhaps they would be less likely to occur. Federal law would wipe out regenerative attacks among such men as made up the Memphis lynch crew. It might, however, put a little wholesome fear in them so that between a first heading lynch attempt and a second, considered try, some would wriggle out of the plot.

But more important, over a period of time, the existence and enforcement of community-penalizing Federal law might so fortify local anti-lynch sentiment that any determined lynchists would have as much fear from their own neighbors as from the Federal government. The neighbors are tax payers, and as such don't want to see local treasuries tapped for \$10,000 fines for any leniency toward lynch mobs.
