THE EAST DURHAM SCHOOL

Superintendent W. F. Warren for a double session has been of no avail. The superintendent apparently takes the attitude that anything is good enough for the East Durham Negro school. The double session teaching requires an additional expenditure of around \$12.50 per month for each teacher employed for that purpose.

There are no cafeteria facilities at East Durham, no place for students and teachers to wash their hands, except one spigot in each toilet, which empties into a can that sets on the floor. Whenever this can becomes full the floor catches the rest of the refuse water, until a student or teacher thinks to empty the can.

The blackboards in each classroom are worn out, and one drop cord for a light is all that has been provided to light the building when lights are necessary. So glaring is the light that the children complain whenever it is turned on, with statement that they can see better without the light than they can with it.

No modern heat-
 ing system exists. Old fashion iron stoves, famous for their ability to unevenly distribute heat, get majestically in each room. We found in two of the classrooms that students actually have to sit within 2 or 3 feet of the stoves in the winter time.

The "auditorium" at the East Durham school has a seating capacity of only 113. The pupils from two of the five classrooms more than fill the auditorium on chapel days or any other days they may find it necessary to go there.

Two stools in the girls toilet and two in the boys toilet are all the city can afford at East Durham school. An inspection of either of the toilets will force one to wonder why the entire neighborhood has not become the victim of some kind of epidemic.

One drinking fountain accommodates the entire student body, and to prevent a traffic jam at the fountain, the teachers have found it necessary to have the children line up in order to get a drink. The picture at the bottom shows the children lined up in the hall and awaiting their time to get a drink of water.

Not permitted to give a more detailed description of the sad but true picture which exists at the school located within the eastern part of our city. We are going to close by hurling a challenge at Durham to rid itself of this most terrible disgrace. We call upon parents and interested citizens of Durham to visit the East Durham school and see for themselves this most deplorable sight. The city of Durham through its board of ed-

ucation is appropriating money for gymnasiums in white schools and the rebuilding of white schools. What is Durham going to do about erecting a decent building in place of the old one at East Durham?
