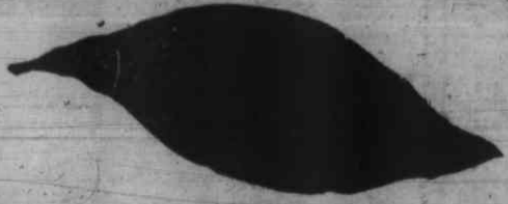

COMING TO HIM

The fact that the Daily News has not been prone to discuss the grist of the city police court and the grinding of Judge Earl Rives may have indicated that as a general thing this household journal feels that the job is being capably handled; but we think a word of commendation in regard to the judge's attitude as evidenced in a case of last week might not be amiss. A white man who engaged in an affray with a negro in a section of the city in their off-hours for purposes of self-improvement was held responsible for the breach of the peace, fined and taxed with the coats, while the negro was freed. Judge Rives in making this disposition announced something of his weariness with and distaste for those of supposedly higher caste who go among the colored citizens in search of liquor or other devilment and indicated a

determination to deal with them more severely than the negroes who might resent their presence.

In the case of a serious violation of the law—if the case in question had resulted in something worse than a mere flatcuff—the judge might have had to bear down on the negro, too; but we think his is an intelligent drawing of the color line. Everybody who doesn't know can readily imagine what would happen to a negro who become obstreperous in a white residential district.

We do not know that the colored man whom Judge Rives let off was championing the rights of his race to courteous treatment by chance visitors; but we think a white man who gets too prevalent in a negro neighborhood should be discouraged, especially by the white man's courts.
