## ST. PAUL DEFEATED BY EAGLES 12-7 TROJANS TRAMPLE HOWARD U. 27-0

### N. C. College Remains On Unbeaten List

The Eagles of North Carolina College for Negroes added their second victory of the season last Saturday when they defeated the Lions of St. Paul Normal and Industrial School 12-7. The game was played before a large crowd of enthusiastic spectators. The Eagles received the kick-off on their own thirty-five yard line. St. Paul recovered a fumble on the Carolina's thirty-seven yard stripe, but an air attack failed to gain appreciable yardage. During the entire first half, the two teams saw-sawed back and forth across the field. The half ended with the score 0-0. Early in the third quarter McCullough, Eagle guard, blocked a punt which was recovered by Lightner, the versatile Carolina State center, on the St. Paul forty-one yard line. Joe Hill, Eagle half-back, and Stroud made sufficient gains to make a first down. Big "Train" Hutchins

went through center from the thirty-one yard line for a touch down. There followed an exchange of punts, without any noticeable gain for either team. With the ball in the Eagle's possession on St. Paul's thirty-five yard line, Joe Hill gained fifteen yards in two plays. A consistent series of plays ended with having crossed St. Paul's line. The Eagles failed to make the extra tally and the score rested, the Eagles 12, St. Paul 0. The Lions returned to the attack with four brilliant line plays. Clark, Bates, and Wood of the Lions collaborated on the home team's first and only touch down. A short shovel pass into the end zone counted for the extra point. The gun found the Carolina team hitting its strides again, but the final score was North Carolina College 12, St. Paul 7.

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### Va. State, CIAA Champs Hand Bisons Defeat

The Virginia State College Trojans continued the march toward their second successive C. I. A. A. championship last Saturday defeating Howard, 27 to 0, on the latter's home grounds. Paced again by fleet-footed Eugene "Ace" Bailey, stellar half back of Cleveland, Ohio, the Va. State team completely outclassed the Bison's in every feature of the game. Not once were the Bisons allowed to advance beyond mid-field, the Trojans' defense stopping offensive threats and only permitting two first downs, one which came as the result of a penalty.

Scoring two of the Trojans 4 touchdowns, Bailey stood out brilliantly throughout most of the afternoon, sprinting beautifully 42 yards to break ice for the Trojans in the last moments of the first half and racing around Howard's right end 6 yards to score again early in the third period. Two other brilliant Trojan backs shared the lime-light with Bailey, Joseph Hall of Philadelphia, Pa., and Joseph Echols of Inglewood, N. J., both of whom brought the large crowd in attendance to its feet by excellent ball carrying several times during the game.

Hall scored one of the Trojans touchdowns by a brilliant 13 yard end run behind excellent blocking. The Trojans fourth
