4 Jiggers of Rum
2 Jiggers of papaya Syrup
1 Lime
Ice to fill one pint shaker
Shake well and strain into glass.

Juice 1-4 lemon
Juice 1-4 orange
1-2 wine glass rum
1 teaspoon sugar

PARSNIP FRITTERS

Sift one pint of flour with one one and one-half teaspoon of baking powder and 1-4 teaspoon of salt into bowl and mix thoroughly. Next beat 2 eggs until light, and after adding a pint of milk to them; stir the mixture into the flour. Follow with the addition of a pint of cold boiled parsnips, grated fine; and after the mixture thoroughly, drop it by spoonfuls into boiling fat, holding the spoon close to the liquid before you venture to drop the contents. Cook the fritters for about 5 minutes, and serve very hot. There should be fat enough to float the fritters, and it should smoke before they are dropped in.

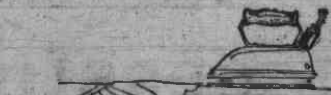
CHOCOLATE LOAF CAKE

Cream 1 cup butter, add 2 cups sifted flour and beat well. Add 5 well beaten egg yolks and beat until smooth. Add 3 squares chocolate, melted over hot water and 1 cup broken nutmegs. Mix and sift 2 1-2 cups cake flour,

The sharp point of this electric iron takes the wrinkles out of the tiniest corner.



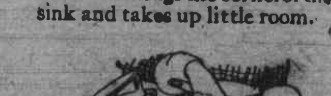
It's possible to cook a whole meal on the table on these electric grills. Try it for breakfast, at least.



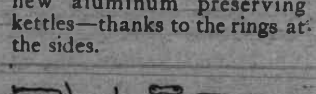
The triangular sink strainer of aluminum hugs the corner of the sink and takes up little room.



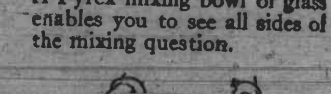
It's very simple to empty these new aluminum preserving kettles—thanks to the rings at the sides.



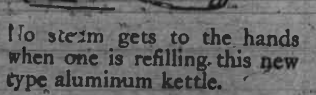
A Pyrex mixing bowl of glass enables you to see all sides of the mixing question.



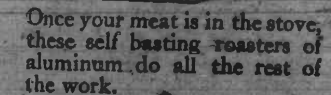
No steam gets to the hands when one is refilling this new type aluminum kettle.
