ST. PAUL TROUNCES ST. AUGUSTINE

Tigers Snatch Easy Victory From Saints

Meeting on Russell Field for the first time in years, the Saint Paul Tigers severely trounced their sister team, Saint Augustine to the tune of 32-0 in one of the cleanest and hardest fought battles seen on Russell Field.

Playing a superb game, St. Aug. found it impossible to break through the line of rough and ready Tigers who mauled and year after year of the season.

In the first five minutes of play, Snead, wiry right half-back of the Tigers, literally threw him self across the goal line for the first touchdown of the game. "Big Fish" Wilson made the extra point on a pass from Clarke.

Recovering a fumble, St. Paul used strategic line bucks to throw themselves deep into St. Aug.'s territory. Then the going was comparatively easy. A perfect pass was completed, Clarke to Wood, for the second touchdown of the day. The attempt at conversion was unsuccessful.

Captain McDowell and E. Johnson presented the most trouble to Saint Paul. McDowell cut loose on a 25 yard run before he was finally cut down. Unable to get their aerial attack

working the Saints of Augustine were forced to use line plays which often ran up into a solid wall of ripping, roaring, clawing Tigers.

The half ended with the visitors trailing 0 to 13.

With Clarke, Bates, and Snead tearing through the Augustia line and a buck by Boyd, the Smithmen crashed the defenders goal for another tally. Again the try for the extra was no good.

St. Aug drew a 15 yard penalty for holding. Seemingly taking a sudden interest in the game, E. Johnson, St. Aug full-back raced the ball through the seemingly mystified Tigers on a beautiful 17 yard drive off-tackle. But to no avail; unable to make first down they lost the ball to the Tigers who immediately sent Clarke off on a 10 yd running spree. Bates, burley 6 foot, 215 pound full-back was elected to attempt to buck the line. Bates, burglarizing the whole game, pulled off an exhibition of "trickery-Susy-Q" and the "Big Apple" for a 35 yard spurt for first down and on the next play hefted the "ole pill" across the 25 yard distant goal line.



Talladega College Wins Over Alabama Hornets

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Nov. 6.—Bama State's hapless 1937 grid machine opened its November wars by dealing a crushing 61-0 defeat to the Talladega College Tornados here tonight before the home fans, and by doing so announced themselves worthy of serious consideration by the 3 remaining conference fo'es on their slate.

Bama State kicked to Talladega to open the game and after 2 unsuccessful efforts at the Hornet forewall, Powell back to kick let the ball roll between his legs to the Talladega 5 where James Dunn, Hornet right end, quickly pounced upon it. Wilkins went over for the marker on the first try and converted by the place kick route. The Hornets then proceeded to add two more touchdowns in the first quarter, one as a result of an 80-yard drive after the second kick off of the game, the other coming when a Talladega kick was grounded on their own 43, and Means went around end for a touchdown on the first play. Here a number of Hornet substitutions were made, and the second quarter was scoreless.

Panthers Mar State's Homecoming Day With 18-6 Defeat

(By Melvin Sykes) DURHAM, N. C.—Before a crowd of approximately 2 thousand, the North Carolina College Eagles went down fighting before a terrific onslaught by the Virginia Union Panthers Saturday, November 6 at the College Park.

Playing in State's territory during the major part of the first quarter, the Panthers were able to go over for their first touchdown. The conversion failed. However, the battling Eagles came back in the second quarter and after McCullough blocked a Union kick on Union's 88 yard line, Hutchins received a pass from Stroud and went over the final stripe. Conversion here failed for the Eagles.

Hard running and accurate passing during the third quarter accounted for 12 more points for Union. Lightner, Eagles center, intercepted a pass on the North Carolina College 39 yard line and from here, Austin and Hutchins threatened the Panthers by making a total of 25 yards in hard drives. Later in the quarter, Lightner blocked what would have been an extra point for Union.

The last quarter proved to be a furious battle with the spotlight on the fast running Austin who, in this quarter, made a 60 yard return of a punt. Neither side was able to score in this quarter and the game ended 18-6 in favor of Union.

TUSKEGEE DOWNS CLARK UNIVERSITY 32 TO 6
TUSKEGEE Institute, Alabama, November 6.—In a sparkling football performance the Golden Tigers of Tuskegee showed definite signs of being on the come back trail by turning back Clark University of Atlanta, 32 to 6, in the Alumni Bowl here Saturday. Scoring twice in the first and fourth periods and once in the second, and booting the ball over for two extra points, the Tigers showed alertness and power and the gameness of former Golden Tiger football teams.

Ellerger, fleet Tuskegee end, started the scoring when Samms stretched him a 30-yard pass early in the opening session. Ellerger evaded a flock of Clark tacklers and scored standing up. Batts, playing his first major football game, swung wide on a 10-yard flank run to turn in the Tigers' second marker. Batts handled the ball on numerous occasions and he gained on each trip whether it was an end run or a line smash. He proved himself to be capable as a ball handler of marked ability.
