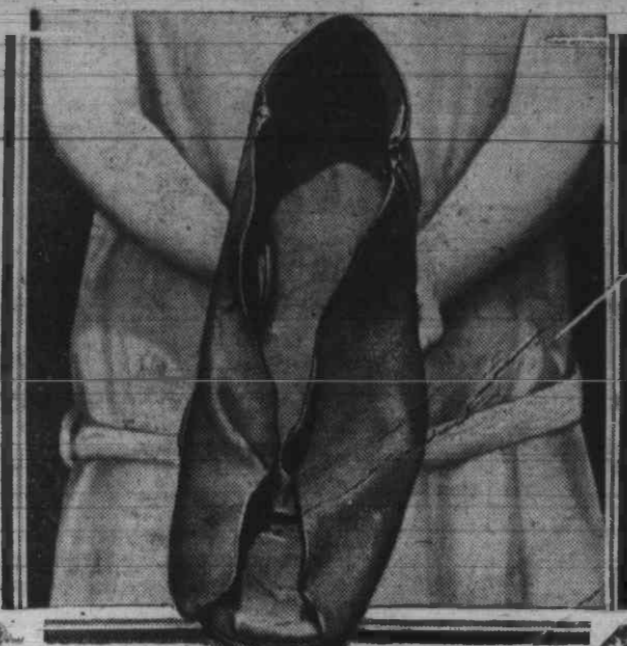

THAT one of the biggest and strongest men the civilized world has ever known was born in Nova Scotia and finally died there about 70 years ago? His name was Angus MacKillop and he was known as the Cape Breton Giant. He was 7 feet 3 inches tall; his girth was 60 inches and he weighed 425 pounds. It was his amazing strength that led to his death. On a bat he lifted off a pier in New York an anchor that weighed 2200 pounds. He had it over his head and was about to heave it into the water when one of the flukes caught in his shoulder causing an injury that brought about his death a few years later. Some relics of this giant are still in existence and included among them is one of his shoes which is pictured in the above photograph.

Lawyers Plan Greater Struggle For Race Rights

WILBERFORCE PRESIDENT SUES G O P HEAD FOR \$100,000 DAMAGES

CLEVELAND, Nov. 11.—(By Clarence L. Simmons for ANP)

— Declaring that statements made concerning him as a result of a recent fiasco probe into the majority expenditures by the board of elections by Ross H. Davis, chairman of the Republican Executive committee, are "utterly false," Dr. D. Ormond Walker, president of Wilberforce university, filed suit against the chairman here recently for \$100,000 alleging slander.

At the height of the hearing Mr. Davis questioned about the funds spent for Mayor Harold H. Burton, shouted out, "Call in Burr Gongwer (Democratic leader) Call in D. Ormond Walker He gave out some Democratic money. He's president of Wilberforce university in case you don't know."

Dr. Walker declared Thursday he would demand that Ross Davis answer in damages for the "malicious slander he uttered against him" because such statements are false.

"When called before the board of elections he charged that the Democrats spent money for precinct workers on primary and that I, D. O. Walker, president of Wilberforce university, had paid out money in their behalf. That statement is utterly false. I made a categorical denial and am today instructing my attorney, Noman L. McGhee, to enter suit against Davis for damages at \$100,000.

"He caused me considerable embarrassment and injury to my reputation and good standing in this community and throughout the state and nation. He shall have to answer and furnish proof of this malicious charge," the school head said.

Just what will really happen to the controversy is hard to forecast for the probe of primary day expenditures was dropped by the Board after Republicans and Democrats mutually agreed to call the whole affair a draw.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6, 1937. The National Bar Association, the National Association of Negro Lawyers, presents a program of ten (10) objectives which it plans vigorously to push during the year ending July 31, 1938. A detailed report has been requested from each lawyer and Regional Director on January 1, April 1st, and July 1st, 1938, relative to the progress made in his community or region covering the objectives.

Such of the reports which are of interest to the public will be released at stated times. The whole of the material will be assembled in July and reported to the National Bar Association, at its convention to be held in Durham, North Carolina, on August, 4, 5, and 6, 1938, in order to inform the membership and the public of what the Association has accomplished since the adjournment of the 1937 session.

The Association will seek:

1. To obtain increased representation for Negro lawyers on legal staffs of Federal, State, County and City prosecutors to insure the impartial administration of the criminal law.
2. To obtain an increased number of appointments of Negro lawyers by the Courts as receivers, Administrators, Attorneys for these officers, Guardians ad Litem, and assignments of counsel to represent indigent defendants in criminal cases, and for more appointments of Negroes to positions on the clerical and custodial forces of the courts.
3. To obtain increased race representation on all juries.
4. To have Negro lawyers take the lead in organizing Citizens' Associations that they may

work for improved conditions in colored residential areas for fire protection, policing, lighting, sewerage, paving, roadways, etc.; in short, to take the leadership for civic improvement.

5. To wage a vigorous campaign in every community for equal educational opportunities for Negroes from the grammar school to the highest level.

6. To urge that every lawyer shall write frequently to his representative in the Legislature and in Congress on matters vital to his community and race; to get acquainted with the representative by correspondence.

7. To put forth the united strength of the National Bar Association, and through its agency the strength of the entire race to fight for the passage of the anti-lynching bill.

8. To watch the progress of the Wages and Hours bill, as well as the Farm legislation scheduled for consideration at the special session of Congress to see to it that there is no differential for Negro workers in the former, and that fair application of the measure is given Negroes in the latter.

9. To wage continual war on crime with addresses in schools, lodges, churches and all other available gatherings. On the day set apart for observance of Lawyer's Day to have the principal speaker use as his subject, "Crime Must Go." Every lawyer to be a crusader in the warfare on crime, which is costing this nation fifteen billions of dollars (\$15,000,000,000) annually.

10. To stress the importance and need of paying poll taxes and registering; and to emphasize the necessity of voting at each and every election. Suffrage Is Our Salvation.
