LINCOLN UNIVERSITY TO MEET LOUISVILLE COLLEGE THANKSGIVING

Lincoln University, Jefferson City, Mo., Nov. 18.—The Lincoln University Tigers will wind up their football activities for 1937 on Thanksgiving Day, November 25, in a Mid-West Conference game with Louisville Municipal College at Jefferson City. A last minute effort on the part of Louisville to break into the winning column or the first time this season and a Lincoln attempt to keep her home slate of games clean as well as to improve her even-stein Conference standing and avenge the defeat suffered at the hands of Kentucky earlier in the season, forecast a hard-fought battle between these two teams on Turkey Day.

The Tigers will enter the fray minus the services of a reliable tackle, Chester Cothran, recently injured in a practice session.

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register at their nearest employment office for work. If there are still unemployed or become unemployed by January 1, they also should register on that date for unemployment compensation and continue to report weekly on designated days, for suitable work and to show they are still unemployed. After reporting weekly for two weeks without getting work, then they become eligible for unemployment benefits for the third week. However, they must report at the end of the third week, and their unemployment benefits check will be ready for them one week later, or just four weeks after they reported their unemployment and applied for benefits.

For example, Mr. Powell points out, if a covered worker becomes unemployed and applies for benefits on January 1, and continues unemployed for three weeks, then he would draw benefits for the third week of his unemployment on January 29, or just four weeks from the date he applied for benefits, unless a different day for delivering his check is designated by the local employment office.

The Employment Service offices are expecting a heavy registration on January 1, of those who become unemployed during the latter part of this year and staff members are making all efforts to get ready for that rush period. The Unemployment Compensation Division is working hard getting ready for paying the benefits as soon as they become payable. Three shifts of workers are busy 24 hours a day in the Raleigh office getting the wage records of workers, sent in quarterly by the employer, posted and up to date by the end of the year, so there will be no delay in getting the checks out as due.

Special appeals are being sent to employers who are not up to date in filing their quarterly wage reports as required by law. These will be followed by urgent demands to those who are still delinquent.
