EDGAR BROWN WINS APPROVAL OF QUARTER MILLION PAY INCREASE

WASHINGTON—(C)—Edgar G. Brown, president of the United Government Employees, won the approval of the House Appropriations Committee for a \$250,000 pay increase for 3,000 federal post office and Treasury laborers in the custodial service throughout the country, it was revealed Friday when Congressman Edward T. Taylor (Col.), chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, Louis Ludlow (Ind.) sub-committee chairman, Post Office-Treasury appropriation for 1938 beginning July 1, '38, Congressman Emmet O'Neal (Ky.), J. Ellwood Daly (Pa.), John Tabor (N. Y.), George W. Johnson (W. Va.), and William Ditter (Pa.), reported favorably a \$300 a year increase for all low-paid federal employees in the field service and the District of Columbia. Of the 3,000 employees affected, 400 work in the Treasury building, Bureau of Engraving and the Washington Post Office.

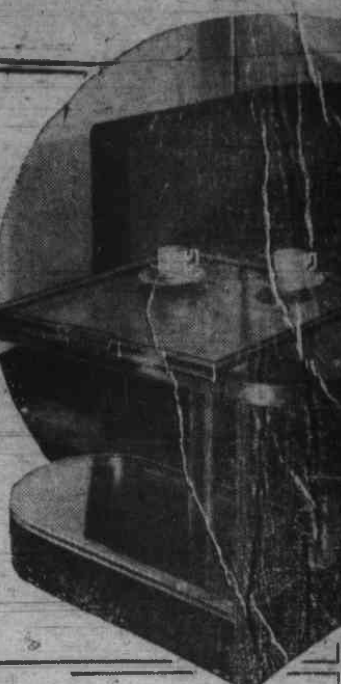
ARKANSAS RESORT VISITED BY NOTABLES

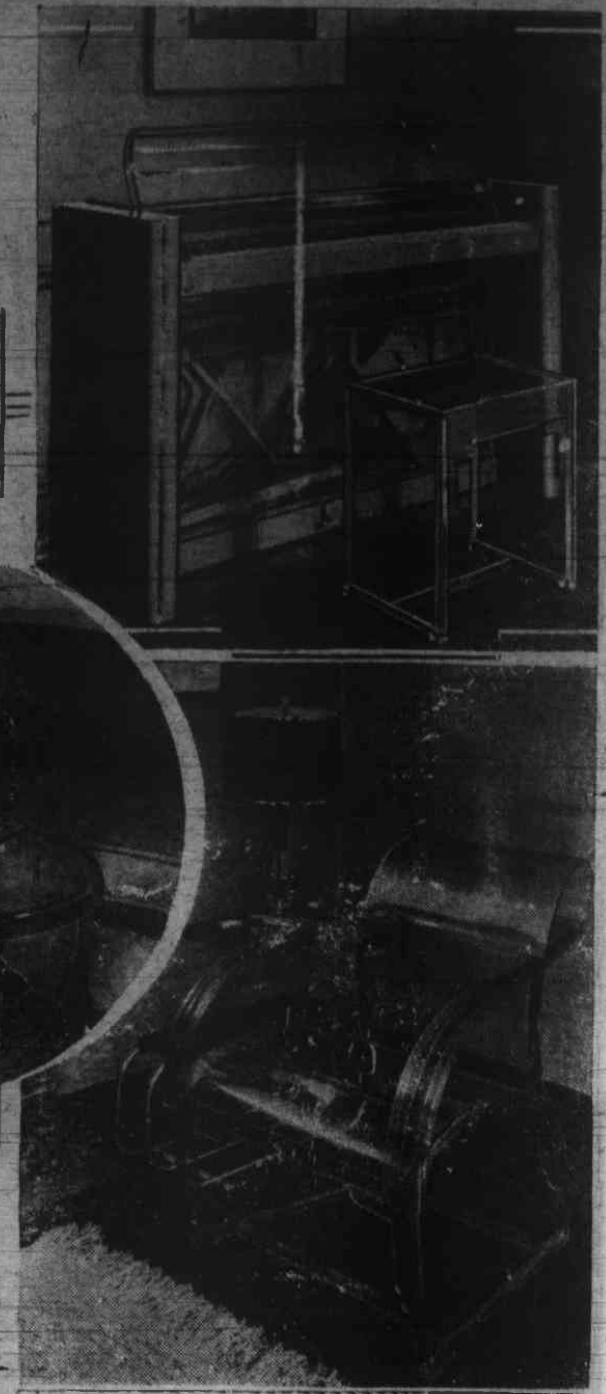
Transparent Plastic Now Used for Furniture
