## VIRGINIA STATE CHAMPIONSHIP LOOMS AS TROJANS DEFEAT PIRATES 40-36

### Union State's Last Obstacle; Pirates End Cage Season

HAMPTON Institute, Va. Feb. 27—The fast Virginia State Trojans quintet turned the tide on the Pirates in the Hampton Gym Saturday to boost their Championship stock to a higher level and to hand the Hampton team its first defeat on the home court this season. Filled with thrill and excitement the game was at no time clinched by either team as both held the lead at interval throughout the game. The capacity crowd that lined the sidelines were kept in an uproar throughout the last half and when Hampton went into the lead for a brief period in the closing minutes the Staters became frantic and desperate. A last minute rally was sufficient to put the Trojans in the lead with the Pirates fighting in vain to score the two necessary goals to tie the score.

State opened the scoring when Johnson, Gary, Indiana basketball star, made good a foul shot. Percy Smith, Va. State's star freshman forward got set on a short side shot long enough to get accurate range and the ball clipped the meshes for two points. Not to be outdone in the long shooting contest that featured the entire game, Tenbrook, the Pirates' most dependable player, aimed at the hoop from the center of the floor and connected for the first goal of the Seaside. The Pirates took the lead on the next goal which was scored by Tenbrook from center court. Johnson of State began to hit his stride and the Trojans ran up a 12-6 lead before the Hampton team could score again. Smith and Hudgins scored two baskets each to increase the Pirate count to 14 but all the while Johnson and Cole of State were tallying for the Trojans. The half ended with State leading 23-17.

State opened the scoring in the second half. Then Hudgins, the main cog in the Pirate offense in the last half, scored four times from the field and one from the penalty stripe and in addition to those goals by Tenbrook kept the Pirates in the running. With about six minutes to play the Seaside took the lead, 23-25, but were forced to relinquish it to the more accurate shooting Trojans. State continued to control the lead and with the Pirates fighting desperately to overcome the four point margin the game ended 40-36 Va. State.

The Trojans used the "zone defense" throughout the game, but when Tenbrook and Smith began to score so frequently from the center court the Seaside were forced to leave the immediate goal area thus giving the Pirate forwards ample shots under the basket which were not successfully taken. Although the Trojans came out on top they were by no means the superior team in this particular game.

This important victory by State marked the first time in several years that they have defeated the Pirates twice in one season.

Hudgins, Smith and Tenbrook were outstanding for the Pirates while Cole, Johnson, and Smith were much in the limelight for the Trojans. Hudgins and Johnson tied for scoring honors with 13 points each.

### PIRATES DEFEAT SMITH BY SCORE OF 34-32

Feb. 22—The Hampton Pirates celebrated Washington's Birthday in defeating by a narrow margin the twice defeated team from Johnson C. Smith in the Hampton Gym, 34-32. Led by "Boss" Taylor, who scored ten points for scoring honors, the Pirates led during most of the game although the score changed several times in the first half. The shooting spree of the Pirates in the last three minutes of the first period was sufficient to put the Blue and White out in front by the narrow margin of 1 point as the half ended 15-14 Hampton.

Smith came back strong in the beginning of the last half to score six points before the Pirates could regain possession of the ball. Oliver and Bowers were accurate in their shooting which was a boost to the Carolinians, but Taylor's four goals and the shots by Toomer from all corners of the forecourt were too much for the visitors. The game ended 34-32 Hampton.

The presentation was made by Dr. Rayford W. Logan, of Atlanta University's department of history, and a member of the committee on arrangements.

## Set Third Louis Title Defense For Chicago On Friday April 1st

NEW YORK, March 2—(ANP)—Joe Louis, busiest heavyweight champion in modern boxing history, will stage his third title defense at the Chicago Stadium on Friday night, April 1, with Harry Thomas as his opponent, it was announced Thursday just one day after the fighter had disposed of Nathan Mann in three rounds.

Louis left Thursday night for Chicago, accompanied by his wife, the former Marva Trotter, who came here to see the bout, after attending a testimonial dinner given for James J. Braddock from whom he won the championship and who is a personal friend.

The Thomas fight will be his third defense since winning the crown at Chicago on June 22, and is expected to be interesting mainly because the white boy has a powerful right punch and was given a technical kayo by Max Schmeling a few weeks ago in 8 rounds. Critics are interested in seeing how long it will take Louis to defeat Thomas. In addition to the knockout by Max, Thomas has taken the count on only one occasion and that was while fighting Unknown Winston in Chicago during 1930.

The match between the champ and the tough white boy is scheduled for 15 rounds and will be the first indoor heavyweight championship ever held in Chicago. Joe will receive 40 percent of the gate and Harry 12 1/2.

Top price will be \$10 including tax. Louis expects also to defend his title again in Detroit later in April, meeting the winner of the Buddy Baer-Gunmar Barlund bout, before his match with Max Schmeling for next June, probably in Chicago.

The Brown Bomber's meeting with Mann was the first indoor heavyweight championship since 1920, when Jack Dempsey kayoed Bill Brennan in 12 rounds. A capacity Madison Square Garden crowd saw it, paying Joe slightly over \$40,000 for less than eight minutes actual work.

So impressive was the champion in defeating Mann that critics called him the Detroit Dynamo of old who knocked out big Carnera, Baer and Levinsky in decisive fashion, and it was indicated he may rule the favorite in the return contest with Schmeling.

Louis took it comparatively easy the first round, being content to score with the finest and hardest left jab in the business, but in the second he started to work after Mann got in a couple of hard ones. Nathan was knocked down three times before the kayo after 1 minute and 56 seconds of the third round, and said afterward he was hit so hard in the second frame he never knew what happened from then until the fight was over.

About Marcus Garvey and his program the distinguished speaker said: I heard of him first when I was in Jamaica in 1915 when he sent a letter "presenting his compliments" and giving me "a hearty welcome to Jamaica, on the part of the United Improvement and Conservation Association. Later he came to the United States. In 1920 when his movement was beginning to grow in America I said in the Crisis that he was an extraordinary leader of men and declared that he had with singular success capitalized and made vocal the great and long suffering grievances and spirit of protest among the West Indian peasantry. On the other hand I noted his difficulties of temperament and training, inability to get on with his fellow workers, and denied categorically that I had ever interfered in any way with his work. Later when he began to collect money for his steamship I characterized him as a sincere and hard working idealist but called his methods bombastic, wasteful, illogical, and almost illegal, and begged his friends not to allow him foolishly to overwhelm with bankruptcy and disaster one of the most interesting spiritual movements of modern world. But he went ahead, wasted his money, got in trouble with the authorities and
