

Pimiento Cheese Biscuite

1 cup sifted flour; 1 teaspoon double-acting baking powder; 4 teaspoon salt; 2 tablespoons butter or other shortening; 4 cup milk (about).

or other shortening; ½ cup milk (about).

3 ounces pikelento cheese; 3 table, spoons butter.

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder and salt, and sift again. Cut in shortening. Add milk gradually, stirring until soft dough is formed. Turn out on slightly floured board and knead 30 seconds, or enough to shape. Roll ½ inch thick, cut with floured 1% inch biscuit cutter, and place on ungreased baking sheet. Melt theese and butter over hot water, stirring until blended. Place 1 teaspoon of cheese mixture on each biscuit. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) 10 minutes, or until done, Makes 15 biscuits.
