Calvin's Newspaper Service TESTED RECIPE

If your family one of those which feel that the meal is not complete without potatoes in some form or other? If that is the case, then you probably rotate between potatoes mashed, boiled, baked or fried. But there is a chance to spring a surprise in the potato department! This recipe lifts the work-day potato into the realm of cooking art.

Potato Puffs
1/4 cup sifted flour; 1 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder; 1/4 teaspoon salt; dash of white pepper; 2 eggs, well beaten; 1 cup mashed potatoes

Sift flour once, measure, add baking powder, salt, and pepper, and sift again. Add eggs to potatoes, beating well; add flour. Drop from teaspoon into deep fat (325° F.) dipping spoon each time in hot fat before dipping into mixture. Turn puffs frequently during frying. Cook brown. Drain on unglazed paper. Makes 18 small puffs.

To vary the recipe, add 1/4 cup chopped, cooked ham or broiled bacon to batter.

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
