

# WHITE PASTOR SPEAKS AGAINST MOBS

## Raps Principles Used By Killers Of La. Youth

RUSTON, La., Oct. 25. (ANP)—The lynching here last Thursday of U. C. Williams, accused of murder and criminal assault, called forth Sunday in one of the city's principal pulpits the prophetic voice of a leading white minister, denouncing the lynching and calling upon his congregation to do all in their power toward the apprehension and conviction of members of the mob.

The speaker was Dr. W. E. B. Lockridge, pastor of the First Baptist church of Ruston. At the Sunday morning service Dr. Lockridge read to his congregation the following statement:

"Our community has suffered a disgrace in the eyes of civilized people all over the world, and believing it to be the province of the pulpit to denounce wrong as well as commend right, I wish to place myself on record as being unalterably opposed to the procedure of the mob near Ruston, Thursday last. The citizens who made an effort to assist our officers are to be commended. I wish to commend the district judge for calling a grand jury to

investigate the case and I call upon my congregation to render every assistance possible in the apprehension and conviction of the leaders of this mob.

"The only mark of a civilized community lies in its ability to control its passions, and murder by a mob is no less murder than that committed by an individual. The victim of this mob may have been, and possibly was, guilty of a heinous crime, but his offense was wrong from him by torture which could have been inflicted only in the wildest frenzy or as the product of another criminal mind."

"The crimes which culminated in the mobbing were the result of another practice condemned by good society everywhere. The victim of the mob was reared in sight of a notorious rendezvous for lustful practices and this daily enticement could not have failed to poison his mind. We cannot condemn too strongly practices of this kind, and ask that some effort be made to keep the highways and roads of this parish free from this practice."
