Harvey Aiston, after you have finished building your mouse, who are you going to put in it?

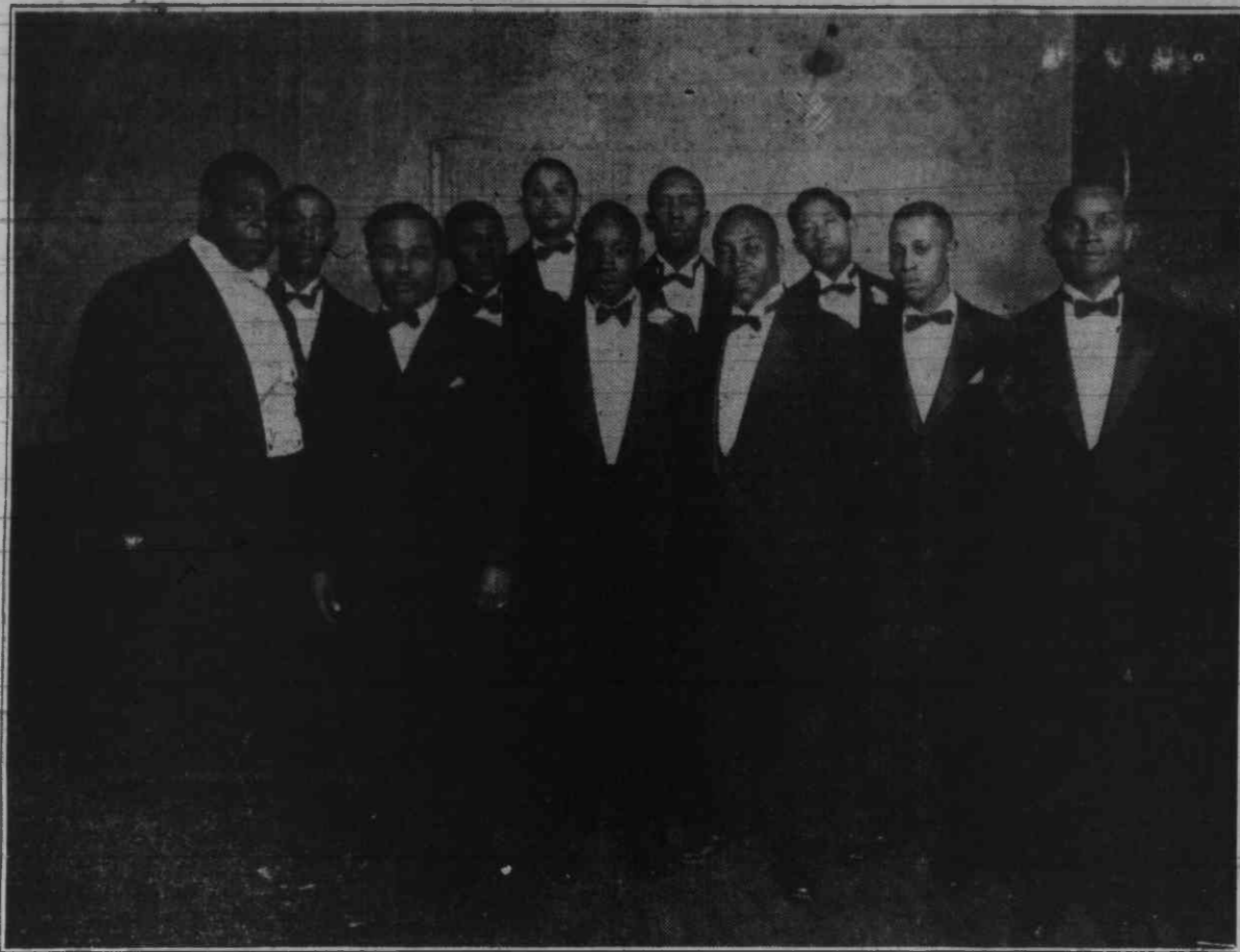
