## White Potato Recipes

In most of the families white potatoes are served practically every day. I love potatoes but perhaps you are emitting potatoes for "figure" reasons. But what about your men folks? Most of them think a meal is not complete without potatoes served in some form. x

Let's try preparing white potatoes in various ways from now on. You'll surprise your family and they find them extremely delicious and unusual.

**ESCALLOPED POTATOES AND ONIONS.** Three medium sized potatoes, three small onions, salt and pepper, flour, two thirds cup of rich milk, two slices of bacon.

Peel and cut potatoes and onions in thin slices. Place a layer of sliced potatoes and a layer of sliced onions in a greased casserole. Next sprinkle lightly with salt, pepper and flour. Repeat process until all potatoes and onions have been used. Pour the milk over them. Fry two slices of bacon and cut them into small pieces. Sprinkle over the top. Bake in moderately slow oven one hour or until potatoes are tender. (A hot oven causes the milk to curdle)

**POTATO AND CHEESE PUFF.** Four cups left over seasoned mashed potatoes, two beaten eggs, one fourth teaspoon salt, one fourth teaspoon paprika, one fourth teaspoon paprika, one and one half cups grated cheese, one half cup milk, one half cup soft bread crumbs, two teaspoons melted shortening.

Add eggs, seasonings and cheese to potatoes. Mix well. Add milk and turn into greased

baking dish. Combine crumbs and butter and sprinkle on top of potatoes. Bake in a moderate oven for about forty five minutes.

**LUNCHEON POTATOES** Scrub three large potatoes, bake about one hour in hot oven. Frizzle two cups chopped beef, shredded in butter for five minutes. Dredge with four tablespoons flour, few grains pepper. Gradually add two cups milk and cook until thick. When potatoes are done, cut each lengthwise, scoop out potatoes, mash, add milk, butter, salt and pepper and beat until fluffy. Partly fill potato skins with creamed chopped beef.

Pipe mashed potato around edge. Place in hot oven to brown potato lightly. Remove from oven; fill centers with hot buttered peas, either fresh or canned. Garnish with sauted mushroom caps.

**PAPRIKA POTATOES.** Wash, peel and cut in pieces enough potatoes to make three cups. Stand in cold water, drain and then cook in boiling water, to which salt has been added, for two minutes. Pour the water off and arrange potatoes in a layer in dripping pan and bake until soft, basting twice with one fourth cup of melted fat, one teaspoon lemon juice and a pinch of salt. Add a generous dash of paprika and serve.

## Calvin's Newspaper Service TESTED RECIPE

As the days get cooler, we begin to use the word "banquet" again. Even our home desserts are banquet desserts. New forms, new flavors and more elaborate dishes are in order. Guests expect them. The members of the family hope for them.

**Banquet Pudding.**  
1 egg yolk; 4 cups milk; 1/2 cup quick-cooking tapioca; 1/2 cup sugar; 1/4 teaspoon salt; 1 or 2 eggs whites; 1 teaspoon vanilla; 1/2 to 3/4 cup diced preserved or crystallized ginger; 1/4 cup cream, whipped; nut meats, coarsely broken.

Put egg yolk with small amount of milk in top of double boiler. Add remaining milk, tapioca, sugar, and salt. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook 10 to 12 minutes after water boils again, stirring frequently. Beat egg whites until just stiff enough to hold shape. Fold hot tapioca mixture gradually into egg white. Cool — mixture thickens as it cools. When slightly cool, add flavoring and ginger, reserving 2 tablespoons ginger for garnish. Chill. Fold in cream. Serve in sherbet glasses. Garnish with additional whipped cream, and sprinkle with ginger and nuts. Serves 8.

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**CLOSER UP ON CLOTHES**

**Color Scheme Important**

**Harmonize Make-Up With Fall Shades**

The shade of powder, rouge and lipstick which has been so becoming with your summer pastels may prove altogether inadequate with the deeper hues you are wearing this autumn. Experiment with a variety of colors until you decide which is best suited to your skin tone and the colors you are wearing. And remember, the make-up which is most natural looking by day is not necessarily the one that will make you most glamorous by night. Many women have two complete sets of make-up, one for day and one for after dark. At night you can get away with more vivid colors which by day might make you look artificial.
