Livingstone Turns Back Elizabeth City

The Livingstone College Blue Bears' comeback trail was vengeance today as they clawed the Elizabeth City Teachers with a crushing 20-0 defeat. Livingstone again came back at the half to score three touchdowns and finish a job well done. Once the Bears got underway, there was little doubt as to the outcome of the game. Led by their versatile captain, LeRoy Spradley, they drove through the hapless Teacher defense for the first three tallies and scored the fourth touchdown on a thrilling ninety yard run by Walt Bowen, after he had intercepted an Elizabeth City pass on his own ten yard marker. The Professors scored early in the second period a 26 yard touchdown pass from J. White to Swain in the end zone.

The Teachers scored first in the encounter after a fumble exceeding just quarter time saw the team miling up and down the field. Elizabeth City gained possession when Spradley kicked to a white on the nineteen yard line, and by a fifteen yard penalty, the Teachers went to the Bear twenty five, from which point White uncorked his beautiful pass. The extra point was made. It was then that Livingstone began to assert her power. Bowen received Furton's kick on this own ten and ran it back to the Livingstone thirty five. Spradley rebled on ten yards at right end, then nineteen yards around left end to place the ball in Elizabeth City territory. Spradley and Gaskins alternated a lugging the leather to the Teacher five, from whence the Bear Captain launched through the center of the Teacher line for the score. Gaskins added the point and the score was tied as the half ended.

He threw a wobbly ball into the air, the leather settling in the waiting arms of Bowen, who raced ninety yards down the sidelines for the final Livingstone down.
