Every person male or female owning an automobile electric Refrigerator or other personal property of value as well as All Males between the ages of twenty and forty-nine are required to list.

CHARLOTTE — A large crowd of mourners from many states gathered at historic Seventh Street Presbyterian Church here on Wednesday afternoon at two o'clock to pay last respects to Mrs. Fannie P. Sanders, widow of the late Dr. D. J. Sanders, first Negro president of Biddle University, now Johnson C. Smith University. Mrs. Sanders died Saturday afternoon about 6:30 at Good Samaritan Hospital.

The funeral Eulogy was de-

livered by Dr. Henry Lake Innes, pastor of St. James Presbyterian church in New York of which Mrs. Sanders was a member for ten years. The services were in charge of Rev. S. Q. Mitchell, pastor of the Seventh Street Presbyterian church. Remarks were made by many prominent persons who knew the deceased, and resolutions were read from Johnson C. Smith University. Dr. H. L. McCroskey, present president of Johnson C. Smith attended the funeral.
