sugar; 4 tablespoons cornstarch;
3,4 tenspoon salt; 2 egg yolks,
elightly beaten; 1 tenspoon vanilla;
2 egg whites; 4 tablespoons sugar;
4, cup shredded cocmut

% cup shredded coconut.
Add chocolate to milk and heat
in double boiler. When chocolate
is melted, beat with rotary egg is melted, beat with rotary egg beater until blended. Combine sugar, cornstarch, and salt; add small amount of chocolate mixture, stirring until smooth; return to double boiler and cook until thick double boiler and cook until thickened, stirring constantly. Then


