## Mrs. FDR Speaks At Bethune-Cookman School

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (ANP)—It took a ninety-mile ride in a police patrol car from Jacksonville to Daytona Beach for Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt to keep her speaking schedule at Bethune-Cookman college here Monday, but 5,000 persons stood in the rain to greet her as she arrived. . . .  
Bethune, founder and president, said she was duly proud of the honor paid it by the First Lady. Mrs. Roosevelt did not disappoint her audience in her speech when she explained the true meaning of democracy. "Democracy does not mean having the same religion or color," she said.
