Negro Congress Convenes In Washington

The meeting in Washington, D. C. last week of the Third National Negro Congress marked a great step towards the solution of the many problems of the Negro people. Delegates came from every part of the country; from all walks of life, workers, farmers, students; from church and labor organizations; and from broad masses of unorganized people. About a third of the delegates were white, a very important feature of the Congress, for it showed that many white people are now realizing that their problems must be solved along with the problems of the Negro.

John L. Lewis' proposal to the assembled delegates to come to a working agreement with labor was received with acclaim by the delegates who overwhelmingly voted to support this move. The delegates were also heartily in favor of the program as advanced by the Congress.

The Congress took a very strong stand against any and all moves to embroil us in this war saying both sides were imperialist and that this was not a war for democracy. It expressed its sympathy with the oppressed Colonial peoples of the British and French Empires and asked when the millions of Negroes in the African and West Indian Colonies would be given their rights of democracy. The Congress also came out very emphatically against any acts or amendments to the present laws which would

been removed before there is much fermentation of the sap, a new cylinder of sapwood is formed, sometimes resulting in the movement of water and nutrients to the top of the tree.

"Application of nitrate fertilizers to the trees often results in more rapid recovery from cold weather damage in the orchard."
