gro should refuse to support movements and programs merely because Communists may espouse them. Should anyone contend that Negroes should not oppose America's entering the war only because Communists take that line, even though the Communists may have different reasons? Certainly not."

"Negroes should oppose America's entrance into the war solely because it is certain to mean the destruction of American democracy, without which the Negro's chance for progress and justice is hopeless, since they would be shorn of the rights of protest and petition.

"How can the Soviet Union, hundreds of miles removed from the domestic problems of Negroes in these United States, have the knowledge and wisdom to apply the leadership in the Communist party to formulate and direct the execution of a program for the solution of Negro problems.

"The Negroes do not reject the Communist party because it is revolutionary or radical, or because of its alleged extremism. They reject the Communist party because it is controlled and dominated by a foreign state whose policy may, or may not be in the interest of the United States, or the Negro people. Recommends GOP Plank

PHILADELPHIA, — A special plank was recommended by colored members of the Republican program committee and the conference of 100 Negro Republicans representing all the states, for inclusion in the party platform to be adopted officially by the National Republican convention. The plank follows:

"We pledge ourselves that the letter and spirit of every protection and guarantee which our constitution and institutions promise each citizen shall be made equally effective and real for our colored citizen, lest his continued exclusion from a fair share in our economic, political and military life shall make false and insincere American claims as the world's chief citadel of true democracy."

This plank was presented by Mrs. Sara Speaks and Francis Rivers. The committee seated Florida and Mississippi and other contended delegations but late Monday the credentials committee was still hearing appeals and may recognize some changes. Restaurants and lunch stands at convention hall were manned by Negro employes of the famous Negro catering concern, Hollands which is owned by William New man, R. E. McKenney was the efficient manager. Hollands also had charge of the Pennsylvania Railroad lounge where free refreshments and smokes were available to all newspapermen regardless of color.
