**NAZIS STUDY**

**AFRICAN DIALECTS**

WASHINGTON, (ANP) — In Nazi Germany, classes are being held in foreign languages, particularly the African dialects, with special emphasis on that widely used dialect, Suaheli or Swahili. Informed persons believe this to be an indication that the Germans are confident of a return of the African colonies or that it is another phase of the fifth column activities for which the Nazis have become world famous. Classes consist of men and women, taught by a proficient instructor who uses the visual method of instruction giving the Swahili terms for the equivalent in German.

These classes are reputedly very popular with the Nazis, the students ranging through all ages.

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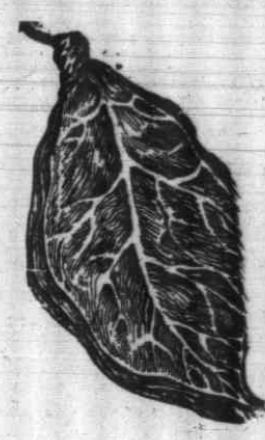
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
