EXHIBIT SERIES FOR THE YEAR FORMALLY OPENS

An exhibit on the history of printing from moveable type will begin on the Campus Sunday, September 22, in the Thomas F. Helgate Library. This exhibit on printing from this kind of type is a relative recent invention. The first book known to be so printed was the Gutenberg Bible printed by Gutenberg, a German, who is believed to have perfected printing from moveable type. Facsimile pages of this bible will be on display. This exhibit, incidentally, is in celebration of the 500th anniversary of printing from this type of equipment. Samples of the PICTOGRAPH, used by Mexicans and American Indians as late as the 14th and 15th centuries, the IDEOGRAPH, and ideas presented in a picture and used extensively by the Chinese today the PHONOGRAM, each character representing a word representing a sound and Egyptian Hieroglyphics will be on display.

MRS. JULIUS CONE SPEAKS TO BENNETT STUDENTS

At the first Convocation of the academic year, Mrs. Julius W. Cone, was introduced to the student body by President David B. Jones as chairman, Building and Grounds Committee of the college board of trustees. In her remarks, Mrs. Cone stated, "Although the lights of freedom, tolerance and immunity, both spiritual and mental, have gone out in Europe, these need not go out in the United States." Mrs. Cone further admonished the students to be like Socrates in finding one's Mt. Olympus, to walk steadily in that direction. President Jones, in his first address of the year to the full student body, compared their building of a future to that of the buildings on the campus. "The architect draws a picture for a building; the individual never drifts into a picture, he must likewise through effort plan one for himself" said President Jones. "There are many things that go into a building for one's life. Among these are Character, dream of what you wish to be, 'being what you are,' HOPE FOR THE FUTURE, 'painting a course,' 'so vital in life's work' and God, 'the power above that stands by.'"
